ACRE ON COLLEGE FARM GIVES RECORD YIELD OF POTATOES

On one of the college farms, Farm Superintendent Goodling dug and measured an acre of potatoes last week which gave a yield of four hundred and thirty-six bushels of good quality potatoes. The yield of the college farm is remarkable when compared with the average yield for Pennsylvania of less than a hundred bushels per acre.

The potatoes were grown from Michigan seed and were sprayed and cultivated frequently during the growing season.

NITTANY BACKS SHIFTED FOR GETTYSBURG GAME

Outstanding Men
 Coach "Bill" Wood and Captain "Snaps" Emanuel are probably the two most interesting figures of the Gettysburg aggregation to Penn State students. Wood is a Penn State man, graduating in 1915. While at Penn State he was a center on several Nittany teams. For a number of years he has been coaching at Gettysburg and in that time he has turned out some strong teams.

Captain Emanuel will be remembered for his remarkable work as an end last year when he was rated as one of the best wingmen and his selection as captain has been a popular choice at the Gettysburg school.

A shortage of backfield material this fall caused Bill Wood to shift the veteran end to the backfield. Since then Emanuel has been playing fullback and has developed into one of the strongest threats of the visiting team. He has been showing good form in running the ball, drop-kicking and hurling forward passes. It was an aerial throw by Emanuel that gave Gettysburg its lone tally in the Lehigh game.

Stauffer, a veteran from last year's eleven, will direct the team at quarterback. Mordan, varsity left halfback and the only man on the team playing his fourth year of varsity football, was admitted to the hospital this week and his place will be filled by Fauber Mensch at right halfback. He will complete the backfield.

The Line

Gettysburg has a strong pair of ends in Singley and Decker. Singley is a veteran wingman and last year very few end runs directed toward his side of the line were good for long gains. Decker, a substitute end last year, has taken the place occupied by Emanuel last season and does the punting for the visitors.

Yost and Jones are the left and right tackles respectively, and both are powerful linemen. The guard assignments will probably be filled by Beechman and Pelus from last year's second team. Slaughter at center will complete the line.

"Be" Continues Hard Work
 During the past week the Nittany coaches have been driving all four teams, with scrimmages being held almost every night. "Be" when asked how the practice was going summed up the week's work in one word, "rotten."

DAIRY STUDENTS PLAN ALUMNI DAY EXHIBITION

Activities of Department Will Be Shown—Dairy Animals To Be on Display

The students in the department of Dairy Husbandry plan to put on a working exhibit of the activities of their department in the forenoon of Alumni Day. At the same time the ribbons won by the different individuals of the dairy herd at the state fairs this year will be displayed.

Creamery butter making, cheese making, ice cream making, and the handling of market milk will be demonstrated. At the dairy barn the students will demonstrate various phases of feeding and the management of dairy cattle.

The fine dairy animals which have been presented to the college during the past two years by different breeders and associations in the state will be pointed out to visitors, and large cards bearing the names of the donors and the merits of the animals will be displayed for each individual.

Because of lack of funds the students and the department will not be in position to stage an exhibit like the ones given in previous years on Pennsylvania Day, but an effort will be made to portray faithfully the work of the various courses in Dairy Husbandry.

TOWNSPEOPLE OF NEW HAVEN TO HAVE PEACE IN FUTURE

New Haven, Conn., October 4.—The Yale Student Council yesterday in addition to deciding to levy a fee of seventy-five cents on every Yale Sophomore who participated in the riot last June in order to defray the expenses of that disorder, decreed that the second-year men should sign a pledge forbidding disorderly conduct, and also decided that the Juniors must take the following pledge:

"I, the undersigned, do hereby pledge that, during my course as a student in Yale University:

"1. I shall not take part in any noisy or riotous actions or demonstration in the streets or other public grounds of the city of New Haven, nor commit any offense against the peace or prosperity of its citizens.

"2. I shall do all in my power to prevent my fellow students from offending against the peace or prosperity of this city or its citizens."
