WILSON SCORES WITH SENSATIONAL RUNS

(Continued from first page) snare With the ball on the twenty yard mark, the Nittany line opened a gaping hole in the Annapolis defense, Wilson, the pliskin nestling in his arm, plowed through and in a moment had used past the second defense, succeeded in by the play Shupley made a desperate tackle but his clutching fingers slipped from the canvas-clad limbs of the elusive back With a burst of speed Harry raced past McKee Seventy-two yards were clicked off by the flying feet of Wilson and for the third time planted the ball behind the Navy's goal line The downfall of the Annapolis team was complete

In the fourth quarter, "Red" Ballinger, substitute halfback, planted a placement kick from the fifteen yard line, averting a shut-out and scoring the final tally of the game. Thus the Annapolis team was defeated by the largest margin since a Navy eleven crushed Penn State by a 44 to 0 score in 1909

Was A Notable Game

Saturday's game was a classic of the gridiron The greatest crowd of alumni, students and visitors in the history of Penn State, crowded the pine stadium on New Beaver Field And it was a glorious battle of the ribbed field returning grays saw a Nittany team triumph in a struggle that was marked by the clean, hard play of both teams

A review of the statistics of the game shows that the Nittany Lion might have proven a succulent morsel for the embattled Middles had it not been for the brilliant work of Harry Wilson Folwell's machine beat and battered its way through the Blue and White defense for a total of sixteen first downs and 285 yards gained in scrimmages as compared to the five downs and 220 yards that were gleaned by the Penn State warriors

Line An Enigma With the exception of the first quarter, the Besokhin line was outplayed and time and again the stalwart Downers or the shifty Barchet crashed through for long gains until stopped by the secondary defense Often the Nittany backs had barely reached the line of scrimmage before a Blue and Gold lineman came hurtling through to smother the Penn State attack before it had fairly started

Yet the attempts of the Middles to push the ball across for a touchdown were as futile as those of Gettysburg the week before Time and again with first downs but a few yards away, the Blue and White line was transformed and became a mighty bulwark against the fiercest thrusts of the invaders, thudding on the very threshold of the Nittany goal line.

PENN STATE'S PROPOSED HONOR CODE EULOGIZED

National Honesty Bureau Member Comments on Student Council Plan for New System

The other day a dog-eared thesis was identified by a professor in a western university as "original work" at six other institutions of learning It is not uncommon for a teacher to be warned to be on the lookout for theses that have already been presented to his predecessor A bright scholar is often popular because he keeps busy preparing papers for football brothers who are engaged to prepare their own theses in a tradition in New England

A refreshing movement is now under way at Penn State College to outlaw all forms of dishonesty in the classroom and on the campus It originated first in the faculty nor in the Y. M. C. A., but in the Student Council, the most representative body in the institution It is a frank endeavor to restore to the non-athletic life of the college the same high standard of sportsmanship which in athletics has long made this institution famous

Upon their return the committees made their report, and recommended formulating a Code of Honor, which should become the Penn State standard In order that it might not be confounded with any so-called "honor systems", none of which had been popular at this school on the Nittany, it was thought best to present the proposed Code to every fraternity and other campus organization and to the organized men, and thus by universal consent to form an agreement which, as one of the committee said, "will meet the hearty approval of every gentleman on the campus"

The matter is still pending, but the consensus seems to be that the Code, in brief, will be that "No liar, cheat, or thief can stay at Penn State"
