Bezdek Not Optimistic. As usual Bezdek is making no optimistic statements on the eve of the game. When questioned last night the Nittany mentor only stated that he expected a hard struggle.

Line Is Strong. Coach Young has developed a strong line. The defensive play of the Red and Blue team has been good this season for none of its opponents have scored more than once and much of the defensive strength of the team lies in line.

Injuries have taken a heavy toll among the Quaker backs and it was a substitute backfield that started against Lafayette last Saturday. Lamar, McGraw, King and Thomas have been groomed for the contest, however, and will start against Penn State tomorrow.

Blues will be held in reserve to fill in at quarterback if McGraw falters. He is a capable field general and has shown flashes of brilliant over field punning but weighing only one hundred and forty-five pounds he has been handicapped by his lack of beef.

Captain "Tex" Hamer will add a powerful punch to the Red and Blue attack. The big fullback excels at line plunging and has made a record this year as a punter that should give Penn a superiority in the kicking department. King and Thomas are a pair of

After this disheartening defeat Penn rallied and came through its remaining preliminary games in a creditable manner. Swarthmore was defeated on October thirteenth by a 13 to 0 score and the next week found Penn again victorious by the comfortable margin of nineteen points to the seven scored by Columbia.

Then came the first hard test of the season for Young's machine. The formidable Centre team invaded Franklin Field and when the smoke of the battle had cleared away the Southerners had been routed by a 24 to 0 score.

A varied attack, combining power, dependability and strategy, was responsible for Penn's triumph. Dorn, veteran center had been shifted to quarterback, Captain Hamer and McGraw were at the halfback positions and Thomas was at fullback. The new combination proved to be a formidable one. The decisive victory did much to renew the confidence of the Penn supporters.

The Quakers continued their winning play and the next Saturday headed Pitt a decisive defeat. It was the first time in a number of years that Penn had humbled the Pitt Panthers and the victory was the occasion of much celebrating by the Penn students.

Lafayette Conquers. But Penn caught a tartar last Saturday in Lafayette and the Maroon team triumphed by an 8 to 6 score. A blocked punt in the third period resulted in a safety and victory for Penn's rivals.

Penn with substitutes in the line and a second-string backfield, could do little on the offense and made but four flat downs and advanced the ball but fifty-eight yards from scrimmage. Lafayette, on the other hand, showed a strong running attack and forward-pass plays that swept the Quakers back for eighteen first downs and a total of 265 yards.

Thus it is that Penn looks back on a defeat and ahead to the game with Penn State tomorrow.

Tom, who is leading him in a hand fight for a varsity berth on Bezdek's Penn State football team. Tom, Tom, Tom, let it be said, is worth a doubt the "biggest family man" in college football in the entire United States and is proof of this.

Just glance at the trio of boys: William, six, Tom, Jr., five, and Carl, at eleven months, and the little girl of this article, who joyously trot for Tom from the sidelines with "Attitude, Daddy, Go 'em."

The four youngsters are present at all of the home games played by Penn State and are living in hope that they can get to Franklin Field tomorrow when the Nittany Lions enter from their hill in the mountain fastness of Centre county to engage the Red and Blue of Penn in the annual tilt between these ancient rivals of the gridiron.

Although Mrs. "Tom," the winsome, capable and thoroughly efficient wife of the head of the household is under the mother of this unusual family is taking too much for his own physical good in both football and wrestling.

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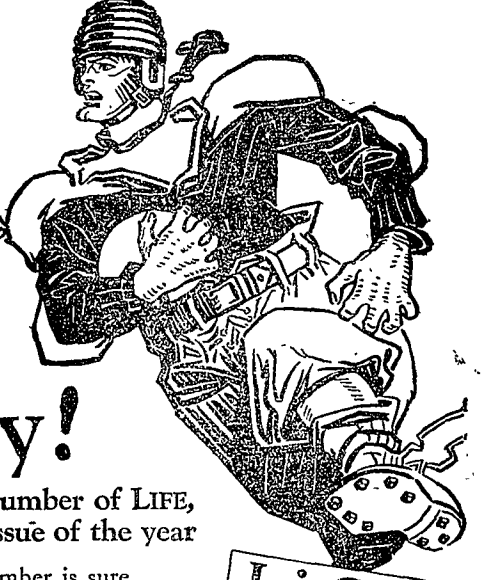
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
