success of Penn State's effective aerial attack

Johnston Stars

Second only to that of Wilson was the brilliant open field running of Ed Johnston. The speedy back tore through the clogs for several home runs but it was in a crisscrossing back kick-off that he showed up best. On two kick-off Johnston curled the ball back for a total of fifty-five yards.

John had his share in the Nittany victory. The lack of tumbling and precision with which Beak's men ran through their plays testified to the leadership of the varsity quarterback. Playing with an injured hip, Mike did not carry the ball but his timely interference and accurately thrown forward passes were prominent features of the game.

State Out-punted

Football was the only department of the gridiron game in which Penn had an advantage. McGraw's long punt came at opportune moments and often took the Nittany backs by surprise. The Quaker quarterback would suddenly shift to a kick formation while a line of signals and before Johnston could get back, would send the boot over the head of the Nittany back.

McGraw and Thomas were the outstanding players on the Penn team. The former led the team well at quarterback and Thomas was the only one who could penetrate the Nittany defense for consistent gains.

Game Starts

Penn started the game by kicking off to Johnston who ran the ball back twenty yards from the ten yard line before he was thrown. Penn State could make little headway and kicked on the second play. McGraw caught the Nittany backfield napping with an unexpected punt and the ball rolled behind the goal line. An exchange of punts followed until Penn got the ball on the Nittany thirty-six yard line when Light's punt went out of bounds. Michalske gave the Red and Blue a

leap that seemed to carry him a dozen feet from the ground, caught the pigskin. Not a Penn man was in his path and Wilson sprinted over for the final tally.

Twice Penn State threatened to increase her margin of victory in the final quarter. A forward intercepted by Johnston put the ball on Penn's forty-four yard line. Palm attempted a dropkick but it rolled along the ground and went out of bounds at the two yard line.

The Nittany attack then curled the ball to the ten yard line. Johnston was given the ball and on a wide sweeping end run crossed the goal line. Palm and Michalske taking out the secondary defense at the five yard mark Penn State was offside however, and the play was recalled. Two more costly penalties came and the battle ended with the ball in mid-field.

EXPERIMENTS BY AGRONOMY DEPARTMENT ARE COMPLETED

The Agronomy Department has just finished computing results on experiments that were carried out last summer. The preliminary estimation of the Mammoth White Jerusalem Artichokes says a yield of twenty tons of tops suitable for silage and six and a quart-

of tons of tubers valuable as human food and also for livestock.

The growth of the tubers continued for some time after the tops had been killed by frost, and there will probably be an increase over the above estimated yield. These figures are highly satisfactory to the Agronomy professors who had charge of the experiment.

The college infirmary during the month of October had its usual number of cases, most of which were of a general nature. The greatest number reported were those of students either ill with tonsillitis or complaining of slight colds. There were no serious illnesses at all reported, and only five patients were ordered to bed during the entire month.

There was a total of 701 visits to the infirmary, and of these 116 were new conditions, while 261 were old complaints.


