distance from the field.

The seating capacity of Forbes Field is small and in offering Penn State one third of the reserved seats, the Pitt athletic authorities have made a generous allotment. With a large alumni and student body to be catered for, Pitt has to meet an unusual demand for seats at its biggest home game.

Under this arrangement Penn State was allotted forty-six hundred reserved grandstand seats, thirteen hundred box seats and fifteen hundred seats in the cheering sections. This year there was an unusual demand from the alumni who have been attracted from the Pittsburgh district and from all over the Middle West to the Pitt game. Under the circumstances it was decided that the alumni should be given first consideration in the purchase of tickets and their orders have been filled from the reserved grandstand seats.

**Students' Tickets**

In the distribution of seats to the students, the senior, faculty, and girls' applications, together with the tickets that are reserved for the football squad, naturally exhausted the remaining seats from the bloc of forty-six hundred seats in the best sections of the grandstand. The junior applications will be filled from six hundred box seats and about one hundred and fifty grandstand seats. The box seats will be sold for three dollars.

It is hoped that all of the underclassmen can be given seats in the cheering section as the result of an additional number of tickets that were forwarded by the Pitt athletic authorities.

With the completion of the new Pitt stadium next year, it is hoped that the annual scramble for tickets for the Pitt-Penn State game will be done away with.

### FRATERNITIES TO FORM NATIONAL ORGANIZATION

A full-fledged national college fraternity stretching from coast to coast, will be formed at the annual Interfraternity Conference to be held at the Hotel Pennsylvania November thirtieth and December first. This will be the first time that a national society will have been brought into being full grown.

The formation of the new fraternity follows a lengthy investigation by the Interfraternity Conference which led to the opinion that a too few college men are given the opportunity of fraternity fellowship. Invitations were sent to most of the local fraternities in the United States to be present at a meeting held in conjunction with the annual Interfraternity Conference for the purpose of forming at least one new national fraternity.

More than fifty locals have already signified their intention of being present for that purpose. In addition thirty-two interfraternity councils are sending undergraduate delegates, some coming from as far as California. A score of educators, among them several college presidents, will be present to join in the discussions of college and fraternity problems with the Conference delegates, which will number close to two hundred and fifty.

been made as to the opponents yet there are several prospective college teams that may meet Penn State this winter. Navy, Army and Penn will probably be met and all three of them will be met away, at Annapolis West Point and Philadelphia respectively. Then, on the home meets, an attempt will be made to choose teams from the following institutions as adversaries: Virginia Military Institute, University of Virginia, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Boston College and Washington and Lee.

### Opposition Will Be Strong

Penn State met four of these above mentioned teams last year and found them all worthy opponents. The Navy was met last year here at State College and returned to Annapolis the victor by a score of five against two. Reports coming from the rival academy are that the team this year is but slightly weakened by graduation and that several promising middleweights have shown up among the plebes.

The University of Pennsylvania, with one of the strongest teams she has ever known, managed to squeeze out a victory here last winter, beating the Lions by a score of four to three. This team also promises to be of high calibre and will likely furnish plenty of trouble for Coach Houck's charges.

The Army, meeting Penn State at West Point last season, gave their visitors a sound drubbing, emerging victorious by a six-one count. If this team is met again, the coaches will more than likely move to be the greatest stumbling block to Captain Miller's matinee boxing is always of an advanced degree among the future lieutenants.

The other team that was on Penn State's schedule last year, Virginia Military Institute, has not been so hard hit by graduation and loss of veterans

and will come north with a team worthy of meeting any college group of boxers. This team is the only one that was returned a loser from any of the Penn State meets, and the score was only four to three, so the Pittany matinee need expect no letup when that team is met.

**Freshman Team To Be Formed**

Coach Houck will not confine his attentions to the varsity team this season, but will also direct the destinies of the freshman boxing team. Although none of the yearlings have been observed in action, yet by the appearance and size of some of the men and by the great number that have signed up for boxing as their winter sport, it is thought that the yearlings will have a competent group of boxers when winter comes.

A schedule will be drawn up for the 1924 matinee shortly, and this schedule will likely be on a comparative level with that of the varsity team. None of the opponents for the first-year men have been selected, but the complete schedule of both teams will be published in a later issue of the COLLEGIAN.

Princeton took second place in the freshman run with Yale third, Syracuse fourth, Cornell fifth, University of Pennsylvania sixth, University of Maine seventh, M. I. T. eighth, Rutgers ninth, and New York University tenth.

**Dartmouth This Year's Favorite**

In the varsity run, Dartmouth has been singled out as a strong contender for the winning place. Composed of consistent runners Dartmouth has defeated Cornell and Columbia during the present season. The St. Louis team, the same, with the exception of one man as that which won the intercollegiate meet last year, will also put up a strong claim for the highest honors.

The teams from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Harvard are both well balanced and should place well in the cross country meet. Penn State's varsity team can not be very well judged as it has not competed in any intercollegiate match so far this season. The men have been kept at work, however, over the course laid out by Coach "Nate" Cattell and are in the best of condition.

### The Intercollegiate Course

The course to be run this year is materially different from the last year's run owing to the construction work done on the Middle Parkway, Van Cortlandt Park. The start will be at the southern end of the Polo field, the runners going north.

The finish of the varsity run will be at the same point as the start while the freshman run will finish at the middle of the Polo field at about the place where the intercollegiate runs started last year.

The course is laid for cross country events in that there is no running on hard surfaces, a sufficient width of the course at any point for easy passing, four hurdles to be negotiated, sufficient climbing and cross country work to make the men other than merely a track event and yet not sufficient to penalize the men who have speed as well as strength. At no point is the ascent beyond the ordinary of the footing laid.
