DELEGATES ATTEND FRAT CONFERENCE

Penn State Is Represented at Sessions of National Greek Organizations

NATIONAL FRATERNITY OF TEN CHAPTERS ORGANIZED

When delegates from fifty-three national college fraternities met in the Hotel Pennsylvania at New York on November thirtieth and December first, four delegates from Penn State were in the group which represented more than one hundred thousand undergraduates from all parts of the United States. Dr. William S. Dye attended as the national president of the Acacia Fraternity, M. D. Mitchell '24 as the representative of the Interfraternity Council at Penn State, and Hummel Gylburn as the official representative of the Pennsylvania State College.

Among the alumni representatives, H. G. Erb '20 was present from Kappa Delta Rho, W. R. Benedict '20 for Alpha Gamma Rho, and C. J. Baney '21 represented Phi Kappa Phi. A new National of ten chapters was formed and recognized by the National Council. Penn State did not enter the organization.

The conference began at noon on Friday, November thirtieth, and lasted through the afternoon of Saturday, December first. The Undergraduate Interfraternity Conference which met at the same time, organized as a national undergraduate interfraternity conference and upon petitioning the National Interfraternity Conference was recognized as such. M. D. Mitchell was the Penn State representative.

Important discussions were held on fraternity expansion, fraternity discipline, state legislation regarding fraternities, and the status of honorary and professional fraternities. While the attention of the body was not engaged with much striking legislation, a great deal of good was gleaned by the delegates from the general discussions and the bond uniting the national fraternities of the country was appreciably strengthened.

Each of fifty-three national fraternities was represented by its national officers, and the conference was thus composed of a truly representative body of men. Besides the national officers, dozens of men from about twenty colleges were present, and undergraduate delegates from about thirty institutions.

The Penn State delegates were interested to note the enthusiasm displayed by the various members present, and letters were read from five nationally-famous men who had been invited but who were unable to attend. Among those expressing regret at the enforced absence from the conference were Colonel House, Alpha Delta Theta, George Ade, Sigma Chi, and President Coolidge of the Amherst chapter of Phi Gamma Delta.

But, said Dean Wiles, in spite of all these enviable records, Penn State must be content to remain in fourth place when considering the enrollment of agricultural students.

The Ag Hall had enlarged further on President Thomas' enumeration of the various ways in which agricultural graduates can save the world and make a name for themselves. In the last part of his talk he urged that everybody do his best to make the School of Agriculture at Penn State rank as high in enrollment and quality as it is possible to have it.

Professor Dressler offers plan. Professor Dressler was the last one of the trio of speakers that appeared, and it was he who suggested a plan to aid in preparing the way for a larger enrollment of students. His plan will unite the chairman of the various agricultural societies into a permanent committee for the purpose of devising ways and means for promoting the enrollment on Ag Hall.

At the close of Prof. Dressler's speech, the meeting was formally closed by the singing of the Alma Mater. Directly after the meeting, the committee of the several agricultural clubs representatives held its first session, which was largely of a formative nature.

COE COLLEGE BACK BOOTS RECORD-BREAKING DROP KICK

The record for drop kicking this season is held by John Pence, Coe College back. In the Drake-Coe game Pence booted a fifty-five yard drop kick for a field goal. Records show that the longest drop kick in the history of football was made from placement in the 3rd game by Maxwell of Princeton in 1892. He kicked the pleskin sixty-five yards.
