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and none too soon either. After writing for some time the Judge left the dining room with an empty stomach, walking good-naturedly at the water and muttering "sorry that I could not wait."

A Consistent Worker

After establishing the Juvenile Court, Judge Lindsey turned his attention to vice conditions in his city and had the satisfaction of seeing Denver swept clean. Among other measures, he was the sponsor of the registration and ballot reform laws of Colorado, and as a result, election frauds in the western state were greatly reduced. He was also a leader in the fight against franchise exploitation in the city of Denver and in the movements to abolish child labor.

Although known most by his connection with the Denver Juvenile Court, Judge Lindsey has taken an active part in state and national politics. In 1905, he was a candidate for governor of Colorado and six years later, was a member of the Progressive National Committee. As an author, he stands foremost in the ranks of literary men of America. Among his most noted works are the following: "Problems of the Children," "The Beast of the Jungle," "The Rule of Plutocracy in Colorado," "The Daughters' Religion" and "Pan Germanism in America."

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ing to raise \$250,000 for the erection of a girls' dormitory as a Grange Memorial to serve as the head house in the proposed group of residence halls for women, on Holmes Field, East Campus, West of McAllister Hall.

Agriculturists Help

A number of agricultural groups are raising funds for the erection of dormitories for men, notably the poultrymen, livestock men, dairymen, horticulturists and others, including the lime and limestone companies of the state who propose to erect a memorial to the late Dr. William Frazer.

The Varsity Hall was the first of the campaign buildings to be started. The Frederick Watts Hall dorm is not a campaign building, having been erected with building funds received from the state during the last year of the Spraul administration. Dormitories to be erected with the campaign funds after other buildings have been cared for, will be similar in construction and adjacent to the Frederick Watts Hall.

Literature Available

The proposed buildings are described in more detail in a booklet called "On the Line for Penn State" which may be obtained in limited numbers by interested students in the outer office of President Thomas at Campion Herdsey on the second floor of Old Main. The full purpose of the campaign and the need of the college for this support is also given in this booklet and in that called "The Faith of the State" which may also be obtained by students at the same place.

The student organization for the "new student" drive in January is rapidly being completed under the direction of the members of the Student Board, headed by D. V. Bruder, president of the Senior class.

Y. M. C. A. IS ACTIVE IN RURAL SERVICE WORK

Church Services and Socials Are Conducted by Extension Workers Committee

In an effort to combine religious work with social events in the rural districts around State College a committee from the Penn State Y. M. C. A. is conducting regular church services as well as monthly get-togethers in the communities of Centre Furnace, Pleasant View and Shingletown. The committee is known as the Extension Sunday School Workers and consists of J. C. Kinard, 21, chairman, and nineteen other men.

Church services are held in the three districts every other Sunday while Sunday School is conducted every week. The social get-togethers are held in a small one-room school house once a month, and though they are primarily for the children, many grown-ups also attend. Religious and social functions.

Several professors of Penn State, including Dr. D. A. Anderson and Dr. H. M. Pattenhouse, are co-operating with the committee in this work and many times have spoken at the Sunday church services. At present, the Workers are presenting an illustrated lecture on "The Other Wise Men," a Christmas story, at the different districts and the talks and lectures will have met with the instant approval of the people.

As a fitting climax to this year's work, the committee entertained the "kiddies" from the rural districts at a Christmas party held in the Armory on Saturday afternoon. A large tree in the middle of the floor was beautifully decorated and each "kiddy" was given a little gift.
