directory this year, but a number have dropped out since the matriculation date. A successful campaign would therefore mean that close to one hundred thousand dollars could be added to the fund which now totals almost \$100,000.

Chairman Bauder yesterday expressed the opinion that all the workers were hopeful of reaching the one hundred thousand dollar goal that they have set. There has been but little change in the canvassing personnel as announced just before the vacation period.

Daily progress of the various teams will be recorded on a bulletin board on the front campus where the number of pledges will be shown each morning, together with the total in subscriptions and the percentage of participation for the various teams.

It is obvious that well-rounded treatment could be accorded the question of race-prejudice and equality views, and the White and Negro met together. As a result of these discussions, the convention informally agreed that it would stand for and work for an equal opportunity for all races.

In regard to war, several resolutions were suggested, but the following one was favored by the majority:

"We believe that war is unchristian, and that the League of Nations is the best means of preventing it, but we should resort to war in case an unavoidable dispute had been referred to the league, or world court without successful settlement."

Prominent Speakers

Among the speakers at the convention were Dr. John R. Mott, General Secretary of the International Committee, Y. M. C. A.; Dr. Paul Blanchard, Organizer and Field Secretary of the League of Industrial Democracy in the United States; Dr. J. E. K. Aggrey, Member of Commission on Education to East Africa; Dr. G. Sherwood Eddy, Associate General Secretary of the International Committee of the Y. M. C. A., and many foreign workers, missionaries, pastors and students.

GREENHOUSE WILL BE ADDED TO EXPERIMENTAL EQUIPMENT

A small greenhouse is now being added to the present equipment of the college. The new house will be used for research in nursery propagation and for research in fruit bud formation in the strawberry.

Although the present equipment provides space for a number of important experiments, work on the strawberry has been hindered thus far.
