Each of Bethlehem and Penn State Philadelphia. The first-officer at Yale on Monday twenty-first and twenty-second will wind up the season.

Foremost among the contenders for the 115-pound berth are M. L. Lehman 25 and L. A. Cuy 25, both men from last year. Both men fought desperately for the position last year with honors equally divided and looking from previous practice another stiff battle for the privilege of representing Penn State in the lightweight division can be expected. G. B. Hunter 24, a veteran on the squad for two seasons looks good for the 125 pound position but both W. L. Staudt 26 and W. C. Deane 26 will give him plenty of opposition. Hazlett wrestled in the 145 pound weight of the freshman team last year but if he can make the weight this year it will put a real tremor in respect to the contest of the twenty-five pounder.

The 175 and 115 pound berths are still in doubt as it is not known whether Cuplin Nauto can get down to his old weight. In the event that the Nitro Cuplin does not make that five he will take "Doc" Evans' old place in the twenty-five pound class. J. L. John 21 is another excellent wrestler but his weight is somewhat light. L. R. Lash 21, a thirty-five pounder and W. R. Hays 25 and P. L. Gaudin 26 twenty-five pounders will furnish some stiff opposition in their respective weights.

For the 175 pound class, Deane has Pop Ehrwood from the football team, J. Puthouse 25, a veteran of last year, and J. Dowd 26, a captain of last year's freshman team. Jules Procest, star tackle on the grid team is sitting the pole in the seventy-five pound class with Bill House 26, S. Baumgardner 26 and J. Davidson 21 close on his heels. But two candidates have stepped up for the heavy-weight class. J. Bardsley 24 and J. April 26, a freshman who has wrestled in the intercollegiate for the first two years, will probably represent the Blue and White this year with April who wrestled in the 175 pound class on the freshman team last year proving a valuable understudy.

W. C. Pearson 21, member of the varsity wrestling team last year, is expected to return to the grid for the freshman team. The wrestling has been reported to be in good shape under the supervision of Coach Deane. Several of the first-year men have displayed remarkably ability. Manager Pearson was suddenly honored recently when he was placed on a committee by the Intercollegiate Wrestling Association to draw up some new rules for the popular college sport.
