DRAMATISTS PRESENT FOUR ONE-ACT PLAYS

Three of the Productions Were Written by Students in Play-writing Course

On Saturday night in the Auditorium the Penn State Players presented a bill of four one-act plays. Three of the plays were written by students in English 17, the course in play-writing offered by Mr. A. C. Cloetingh, director of the Players and the fourth play was a Tarkington production.

The first play was 'The Anchor' written by Martha Taylor '25. The play of Elizabeth Meads '21 in the role of Mrs. Robert Wilson was by far the outstanding feature of the production.

The second show was 'The Travelling Place' by Booth Tarkington. This performance was its sixth presentation this fall. Its success seems to have grown with its appearances.

The third play was 'The Ace People' by W. B. Morgan '25. This was a clever comedy which played readily. The work of W. B. Morgan '25 and Lillian Baker '27 was especially noteworthy.

Has Allied Art

There are scores of promising or successful musicians who acknowledge Casals as their benefactor, but the most interesting and original thing that he has done for young artists in general was to free them from prejudice in favor of old instruments.

Casals conceived the idea of a test for cellos and after it was successfully carried out, the same test was given to violins. The test was made before the best known musicians and critics in Paris. It was made in this fashion: the hall was darkened, so that Casals, who played the instruments himself, could not see what cellos were handed to him.
