**PENN STATE STUDENT SPEAKS AT CONFERENCE**

**College Law-enforcement Bodies Meet At Washington—Admiral Sims Is Principal Speaker**

Penn State received a signal honor at the Intercollegiate Conference of Law Enforcement which was held in Washington D. C. on January twelfth and thirteenth when the Military representative, "A. G. Leaman" of the State, was included among the speakers of the evening. He spoke on the attitude of the American student toward Law Enforcement, following Dr. Robert Heide of Lausanne, Switzerland who gave the foreign students attitude toward strict law enforcement and Harry S. Warner, national secretary of the Intercollegiate Prohibition Association.

Another honor was accorded the Penn State delegate toward the close of the meeting when he was appointed chairman of the student committee to form practical solutions for existing conditions on the American college campus. At the open discussion on Sunday January thirteenth, Penn State was frequently mentioned and applauded for the action taken by student Council in regard to Law Enforcement.

**Admiral Sims Speaks**

Due to the fact that the ball room of the Hotel Raleigh at which place the conference was held, was not large enough to accommodate the large crowd of delegates present at the Saturday evening session, of which Admiral Sims was the main speaker, the representatives met in the Auditorium of the Cavalry Baptist Church in his message to the student delegates, Admiral Sims said, "It is up to you to stop, look and listen—it's up to you to do some serious thinking—to form the habit of thinking as the future is in your hands."

"The influence of our young men on the future of the United States will be very great. In a few years you will be the controlling force in the nation. Our future and the world's future will be determined by your moral equipment, your clean flesh, your physical stamina and your ideas of private and national life."

day an enormous undertaking for an instrumentalist. His tour will take him from New England to Colorado, with recitals in every important city enroute.

Despite the fact that the public has long considered the violin as the king of the stringed instruments, musicians and critics long ago granted first place to the cello. The prevailing popularity which the violin possesses over the violoncello with the vast majority of music-lovers is, undoubtedly, due less to any inherent characteristic of the instrument than to the remarkably small number of great artists who have devoted their efforts to the cello.

**Popularized 'Cello**

At the age of eleven, Casals could play the violin, piano, and the cello with equal skill. When asked recently why he chose the cello, with its comparative difficulties and obscurity as a concert instrument, in preference to the violin, he answered, "I chose the cello because it is the instrument having the widest capacity for expression, on it one may do more than in any other—more than in any other instrument—more than in any other instrument—more than in any other instrument."
