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PROF. A. J. WOOD ATTENDS MEETING IN NEW YORK

Professor A. J. Wood, representing the American Society of Mechanical Engineers and the Engineering Experiment Station of Penn State, attended an important conference in New York last week called by the engineering division of the National Research Council. The purpose of the conference, which included an invited group of engineers, physicists and chemists, was to lay before the Council the necessity of co-ordinating the various interests and extending the investigations so that constants of accepted value can be established.

The Engineering Experiment Station at this college is one of the recognized centers of investigation and its equipment is unequalled in this field. A recent president of the American Society of Refrigerating Engineers remarked that the work now under way at this college is of more importance to the refrigerating industry than anything done in the last ten years.

NITTANY STUDENTS TO VOTE ON PEACE PLAN

chance to take part in the discussion and formulation of opinion on this vital topic.

The American Council on Education is cooperating with the Peace Award in this enterprise by sending to universities and colleges copies of the plan and by urging them to encourage faculty and students to discuss the proposed plan and to vote on it. For this purpose, ballots have been sent to Penn State and the desired vote will be taken this week.

In order that the vote may be taken solely on the merits of the plan, the Policy Committee, with the consent of Mr. Pugh, has decided not to disclose the authorship of the plan until after the referendum on early in February. For this reason it is desired that the vote of all large groups be completed as soon as possible and all students at Penn State are urged to cast their ballots before Thursday.

The Plan in Brief

It is the wish of President Cheney to set the opinion of the entire college on the proposed plan. Not only the vote of the student body desired, but those in charge wish the students to study and discuss the proposed measures before casting the votes. For those who may not yet be acquainted with the subject the salient features of the proposed are presented in brief as follows:

1. That the United States shall immediately enter the Permanent Court of International Justice, under the conditions stated in Secretary Hughes' and President Harding's February, 1921

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
