NITTANY RUNNERS COMPETE AT INDOOR MEET TOMORROW

Nine Trackmen Leave Tonight for I. C. A. A. A. Event—Will Run against Strong Field

FRESHMEN-ARE ENTERED IN MEDLEY RELAY RACE

Cartmell Will Start Fitzpatrick and Barclay in Mile and Two Mile Events

Coach Nate Cartmell will pit nine Nittany trackmen against the leading college runners of the East at the annual indoor meet of the I. C. A. A. A. on Saturday night. A freshman medley relay team and five varsity runners are included in the personnel of the team that will leave for New York tonight.

The meet which will be staged at the twenty-second Regiment Armory is the largest college event of the indoor season and it has attracted entrants from many eastern colleges. The Penn State runners are in fairly good shape, although Luck and Moore have been off form this week, probably because of the week-end trips that have taken them to the various meets in the eastern circuit.

The medley relay race which includes the half-mile, four-forty, two-twenty and mile runs. H. A. Kittle will lead off, running the half mile and will be followed by J. W. Bunting who runs the four-forty. T. A. Mathias covers the third distance, the two-twenty, and J. H. Stewart finishes the race with the mile run.

The freshmen have been showing lots of promise in practice and Cartmell is looking for them to make a good showing. Competition will be keen, however, for there are ten vying teams.

In their first appearance this season before a Penn State audience the Mandolin Club will conduct the fourth of the mid-winter concerts next Sunday afternoon at three-thirty o'clock in the Auditorium. The concert will open with three selections by the combined club, "Young America," "Lullaby," and "Thinking Stars" by Odell. Following this Mrs. A. C. Cretzschmar will sing two soprano solos, one a selection from the opera La Boheme, and the other an old Scotch song.

The newly organized mandolin sextet, under the direction of W. M. K. Fulton '24, will play before an audience for the first time this year. The sextette was the musical attraction on the broadcasting program at the Penn State radio station several weeks ago. DEAN WARNOCK COMMENTS ON ACTION OF SENATE COMMITTEE

COMMITTEE OF INTERFRATERNITY AND INTERMURAL COUNCILS PETITION SENATE TO RESCIND JUNE HOUSEPARTY REGULATIONS

Dean Warnock commenting on the recent recommendation that Commencement house-parties be eliminated in so far as undergraduates are concerned, said: "The recommendation made by the senate committee on student welfare has the unanimous support of the whole committee and meets the urgent demands for some action voiced frequently by many responsible members of the faculty. It was intended to help correct two general defects—a weak attitude of the fraternity group toward good scholarship, an attitude presumably influenced among other things, by a supposed over-emphasis on social affairs, and a defect in the Commencement Week program presumably due to a lack of balance in that program. The report issued by the committee sets forth the argument on these points. I have nothing to add to that.

"There is one point, however, on which I think there should be a clear understanding. A good bit of the resentment inevitable when drastic action of this sort is proposed, seems to be due to a feeling on the part of fraternally members that the committee is not only abrupt, but illegal.

"In September, 1922, President Thomas in the opening convocation suggested to the fraternity group that a remodeling of the Commencement program seemed to him to be needed in order to cover the best interests of the College. For the last year and a half I have urged fraternally leaders to get busy on the problem. I have also (Continued on last page)

CAST TO BE SELECTED FOR THESPIAN COMEDY

Director States that Play Can Be Staged within Five Weeks after Casting

According to a letter received this week from Ned Weyburn, Broadway producer who has been secured to coach the Thespian show this year, Leo Morrison, personal manager for Weyburn, will arrive at Penn State on March tenth to cast the production and immediately set into rehearsal. Mr. Morrison will conduct the try-outs in a professional manner and hold the show for two or three days before turning it over to one of Weyburn's personal coaching staff.

In the communication, Mr. Weyburn stated that the show would be ready for a performance five weeks after the arrival of the casting director and, as a result, the Thespian Club has begun actual preparations for the staging of the production. This is the first year in the history of the club that it has been possible to produce a student play and within the next two or three years, the Thespians will be ranked with Penn's Mask and W. G. Connell's Masque, Princeton's Triangle and other similar college organizations if this progress continues.
