Great Stars for Syracuse  
 Great playing a leading role in the game was a hard man to stop. Before the fast-start dribbler on the floor before the hunt of the Orange network coupled with the aid he received from McGhee and Trout, the Syracuse flash made things lively for the Nittany boys.

At one time during the second half, the Penn State team led 21 to 12, but a rally brought Syracuse within two points of the Nittany five. It was after the game-back started by the Syracuse press during the last five minutes of the game to be exact that McGhee led as with his shot from mid-court that took the heart out of the Orange team.
