PENN STATE FIVE FACES LAFAYETTE TOMORROW NIGHT

Coach Hermann To Use Same Team that Opposed Allegheny Last Night

GAME WILL GET UNDER WAY AT SEVEN O'CLOCK

Maroon Tossers Have Won but Four out of Sixteen Games—Will End Season Here

With a one-day rest period, the Penn State basketball team will face the Lafayette College quintet tomorrow night on the Armory floor at seven o'clock. The game played last night with the Allegheny five was not staged in time to catch this edition of the COLLEGIAN.

Coach Hermann will bring the same five-up into action against the Maroon team that he selected to start the game last night. With the squad in good shape, the day of rest will put the Nittany tossers on edge for the contest tomorrow evening.

Victors To Close Season
The western invasion of the courts of Bucknell and Penn State will close what has been a rather disastrous basketball season for Lafayette. So far the Maroon team has won but four games and has dropped twenty.

Contain Cries and Hoots will start at forward in the game tomorrow night with Duffy at center and Kearney and either Millman or Repp at guards. Repp has been playing the guard position regularly, with Millman substituting. Millman was billed to start in the northern trip against Buffalo, Rochester and Niagara last week, but was unable to make the trip owing to a reaction of trouble with his eyesight which followed an injury to his eye in football last fall.

The Lafayette squad opened its preliminary practice last fall without the services of Coach Bill Anderson, former Lafayette star, and all American forward. Anderson was fighting blood poisoning from the first of October until Christmas. He took charge of the team following the Christmas recess after the team had already played the University Club of Brooklyn and Rutgers.

PLAYERS SET DATE FOR SHOWING OF "LOYALTIES"

Play To Be Presented in Auditorium March Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth

As their anniversary production, The Penn State Players will present "Loyalities" on the evenings of March twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth in the Auditorium. This will be the first showing of this popular melodrama by an American company, and it was only by permission of its author that the unusual concession was made to an amateur dramatic organization.

The cast for this play is a strong one, including in its ranks the best actors of which Penn State can boast. Among those playing the major parts are Miss Madelyn Wright, 27, Miss Constance Ordan, 24, Miss Mary Ferguson, 24, C. J. O'Donnell, 25, H. G. Hoehler, 24, F. S. O'Sullivan, 26, F. D. Young, 24, and A. E. Heimbach, 24.

The plot of the play is very ingeniously worked out, running true to melodrama. The play concerns the theft of a large sum of money and shows all through its lines the conflict between Hebrews and Christians. Much new and elaborate scenery is in the course of construction and a special type of program is being planned. With these extra features added to the strength of the lines and the cast, this play should back nothing of at least equalling the success attained by former Player anniversary shows.

FOURTEEN FRESHMEN BROUGHT BEFORE TRIBUNAL THIS WEEK

JUDGE ARMBRUSTER SENTENCES THREE YEARLINGS TO RECEIVE HAIR CUTS FOR APPEARING WITH MEMBERS OF THE FAIR SEX

Before one of the largest groups of students that ever witnessed its proceedings, the Student Tribunal met out Justice to fourteen freshmen last Wednesday night in Old Chapel. Two of the cases were pleas for the suspension of customs, while the other twelve were for violation of the freshman code.

J. K. Lilly and J. L. Bush asked to be relieved of taking freshman customs on account of a year's residence at other colleges. Lilly is a student at College of the City of New York, while Bush attended Waynesburg. Judgment was suspended on both cases.

Charged with making themselves conspicuous by freshmen at their hearing were R. L. Jones and J. V. Dyer, next faced the judges. Both men denied guilty, making no defense. As a penalty, they appeared before the halves of the basketball game last night dressed as Greek charioteers and riding Kiddle Kats, bearing on their backs placards advertising the Architect's play tomorrow night.

Levie R. Motts was next brought before the Tribunal, charged with associating with a young lady other than as sanctioned time. Motts denied the charge and in the absence of any direct evidence the case was postponed until the next meeting of the body.

The 1925 La Vie staff has worked hard to make this one of the best publications turned out by the students of Penn State. A rough proof of the Junior edition has been received and compared favorably with those of other years. It was recently examined by a representative of the Art-craft Guild who has seen the leading manuscripts throughout the east and mid-west, and he pronounced that the book was very well planned and written, and that Penn State had completed more and gone further in the work than any other college which he had visited.

The cover design is by G. W. Rustay, the staff artist for the 1924 year-book. The cover is green with a large lion's head stamped in gold. A special feature of this year's edition is the use of color plates for the sectional divisions. These drawings are the work of D. H. Porterfield '23, who has also contributed some work of excellent quality in other parts of the annual.

The only entrance to the dance floor according to the rules for use of the Armory there will be no smoking either in the Armory or the vestibules, and at no time or place will drinking be tolerated.

As last year, a canopy will be erected at the front entrance to the Armory, and on the left side of this canopy will be placed two exits connected with the ceiling and separated by a forty foot counter in this way the wings of the dancers will be well cared for without using any inside space in the Armory.

That there should be more unity in the method with which class dues are paid at Penn State was the decision of the Student Council at a meeting of the student government yesterday afternoon. This decision came after the Council had decided to drop the plan of compulsory class dues, which called for the payment at the same time that the fees were turned over to the college treasurer.

Several suggestions were made concerning the manner in which this system of class dues should be carried out. One of the best suggestions was that one day in the college year should be set aside for the payment of class dues and after a student had turned his money over to the class treasurer, he would receive a card or other emblem to carry around for the remainder of the day, thus showing that he had "paid up". Other plans were turned but discussion was closed when D. V. Jaeger '24, president of the Council, appointed a committee, with W. F. Atkinson '24 as chairman, to further investigate the matter.
