### COLLEGE INFIRMARY IS KEPT BUSY BY STUDENTS

During the month of February there were 2522 school hours missed on account of illness and 162 excuses granted. Seven hundred and ninety-nine visits were paid to the infirmary. Of these, 267 were for treatment of old conditions and 371 for treatment of new complaints. The infirmary had a total of twenty-two bed patients during the month.

There was no serious illness among the students. Colds, coughs, tonsillitis and mumps made up the majority of the diseases. About twenty-five cases of mumps were treated.

The home season was opened up with a 24-12 victory over Swarthmore and a victory over Rutgers. Pitt took the next contest by a one-point margin and then Muhlenberg, Washington and Jefferson. Lehigh and Rochester claimed hard-fought victories before the Madison team took a one-point win from Nittany. That was the third game, 22 to 21, in last week's three-game trip. The Lafayette losses returned from the north last Saturday and this evening lost its return game to Lehigh, 22 to 19.

Bill Anderson's men started the season under a serious handicap. Curtis Doug Crite, a junior, was in charge of the early season workouts. He had Moore a forward, Duffy, center, Kearney, Pepp and Millman, guards, victims from last season's squad to play on. Hook has developed during the last six weeks and has supplanted Moore in the regular line-up.

Kearney and Pepp will make their last appearance on the court for Lafayette against Penn State. Kearney has been a better man in football, playing substitute quarterback.
