Penn State Team Scores 44-22 Win on Thursday Night—Maroon Loses 34 to 14

LIONS MEET CARNEGIE TECH TOMORROW NIGHT

Nittany Five Plays Loose Game on Saturday—Pool Shooting Features First Contest

Staging a double win, the Nittany passers handily defeated both Allegheny and Lafayette over the sophomore Hop week-end at Penn State. The first game with Allegheny on Thursday night was the faster of the two, and the Blue and White five triumphed over its opponent 44 to 22. Stagnant play in the second game was largely played and wound up with the Lions on the long end of a 34-14 score.

The regular line-up with G. H. H. and McVicker at the forward posts, Foster at center and Captain Loeffler and Head holding down the guard positions, was used to start both contests.

Play Skilful Tomorrow The Blue and White quintet will leave State College tomorrow morning for Pittsburgh where they will again meet the Carnegie Tech passers in the field game tomorrow night. This game was originally scheduled for February 18, but was postponed when the scarlet fever epidemic broke out on the Skibo campus.

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NAVY BOXERS SINK PENN STATE TEAM BY 4 TO 3 COUNT

Washington Gets Technical Knockout—Wert and Madera Win Decisions

FAST BOUTS SHOW GOOD CONDITION OF FIGHTERS

Taking its first meet of the season, the Penn State boxing team went down to defeat at the hands of the Navy boxers last Saturday evening by the score of four bouts to three. The members of both teams were in good condition and displayed good ring generalship. F. A. Washington '25 won a technical knockout against his Navy opponent in the 125-pound bout while Wert and Madera both won decisions for the Nittany team.

The opening bout of the meet in the 115-pound class was fairly evenly matched. T. McClellan '26 of the Blue and White putting up a scrappy fight against his Navy opponent. The Navy fighter displayed the more aggressive action of the two and was awarded the decision by the judges at the end of the third round.

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SEVEN MEETS COMPRISE SPRING TRACK SCHEDULE

Penn State faces a stiff track schedule this spring with four important dual meets in addition to the Penn Relays, the national Intercollegiate and the Western Pennsylvania Intercollegiate. The schedule is arranged by Manager A. B. McQuinn and has been approved by the faculty and administrative committees.

The spring season will open with the Penn Relays on April twenty-fifth and sixth. The Carnegie Tech meet takes place on May seventeenth in connection with the annual Penn State Intercollegiate. Navy will be encountered in a dual meet at Annapolis.

The complete schedule is as follows: April twenty-fifth and sixth, Penn Relays; May third, Syracuse at home; May tenth, Navy at Annapolis; May seventeenth, Carnegie Tech at home; May twenty-fourth, Western Pennsylvania Intercollegiate at Pittsburgh; May thirtieth and thirty-first, Intercollegiate at Cambridge and June seventh, Pitt at home.
