Although Carey will represent Penn State in the light-weight division the blonde-haired lad will be forced to look out for his trunks next week for "Jesse" Lehman has been showing improved form right along and is giving Carey a great run in the nightly workouts. In the 145 pound class Black will again represent the Lion although Johnson is stepping right along in this division.

Idea of loyalty. Nittany, in a group of twenty or more people of different types and classes such as is found in Lovell's this idea of loyalty is open to various interpretations. A prominent Metropolis writer in the New York Tribune has summed up the opposing loyalties, bringing his judgment on the London production.

"The first of his loyalties is spirit de corps—the loyalty of his comrades to soldier and a gentleman. An example of this is found in the play when a Jew is robbed and accused in England. Captain of the theft. Loyalty binds to the latter side the men of his caste, who with the Jew that, as he has no evidence he must not in his accusation public, lest he be socially ostracized."

Loyal to Race

Another kind of loyalty is found in the Jew's loyalty to his race, his pride in it, and his defiant scorn of the "anti-Semitism" that in society oppresses him. He does repeat his charges, such as in a London club. Following this action the third class of loyalty is brought forth, this one being loyalty to the club, whose committee decrees that the Jew and the captain must fight out the question in the arena, as either one is a traitor of the other's tribe.

The fourth kind is the unwillingness of the soldier who represents both parties to betray the honor of his profession when he has received certain evidence that indicates the truth. Closely connected with this is the fifth loyalty which consists of the perfect confidence existing between the soldier and the counsel which requires the former to impart the evidence to the latter. The final of the loyalties is the bulk of the comedy, one of the parties that one ought to stick to his friend, right or wrong, though he may be.

According to this same writer loyalty of any kind is not sufficient of itself. In his statement he says "The text, to quote the first line of the play is that keeping faith is not enough. The loyalty of individuals to individual of class to class and even loyalty to such abstract matters as a confession of a country, or even a race is not enough. Loyalties diverge, friend-ships conflict, duties vary when a section of society is confronted with a truth. Loyalties cut up against each other. They may even cause grave injustice. That is what happens in the play."
