Four Decisions and One Knockout Give Penn State Victory by 5 to 2 Count

MADERA GETS TECHNICAL KNOCKOUT OVER BRYAN

Outclassing its opponents in the majority of bouts, the Penn State boxing team scored a 5-2 victory over the V. M. I. team in last Saturday's meet.

The meet was started off with a win for J. T. McClernan of the Nittany combination in the 115-pound class.
