NITTANY BASEBALL TEAM HOLDS FIRST OUTDOOR PRACTICE

Forty-five Candidates Remain on Squad—Killing Plans To Make Cut Soon

SIX VETERANS REPORT FOR OPENING PRACTICE

Kerstetter and Zeth Battle for Receiver's Berth—Hurlers Show Up Well

The first outdoor practice of the season was the program for the Nittany baseball candidates the earlier part of this week, this practice being in the nature of hitting drill. Coach Glenn Killinger hoped that the ground would be sufficiently dried up by tomorrow so that infield work might be possible, but the sudden change to windy weather makes this improbable.

Also than forty-five candidates remain on the squad now, several freshman pitchers being included. This number will not be decreased immediately although it will be but a matter of a few weeks before "Killy" begins cutting his squad. A number of the original early prospects have already disappeared, turning instead to other spring sports.

Among those who have been eliminated by this route are "Ray" Gray, who is now devoting his attention to spring football, and "Puckle," one of last year's freshmen nine, who is trying for a berth on the 1924 team.

Short Contests Planned
As soon as the weather permits, five-inning contests will be staged on New Beaver field. Until that time, however, all of the work will be carried on at Old Beaver field. It is the desire of the coaches to hold the first "trial" matches of the season this week, probably tomorrow, depending again on the weather.

Several hard-working men are out for the position of catcher, but it seems at this time that either Kerstetter or Zeth will draw the titular assignment when the umpire first calls out "Play Ball." Zeth from last year's squad is also showing up well but the other two will probably be given preference over him because of their better ability in most departments of the game.

Infield Candidates
Looking over the infield prospects, Putina, Loeffer and Reed are found back from last year's organization. Putina has been in Italy but will be out in uniform within a few days. Reed and Loeffer are showing up on better advantage than the other aspirants for the positions of second base and shortstop, respectively. For the hot corner, Mads and Eisenhart of the 1923 yearling line, open to be the best bats in the lineup. The left handed hitter in addition to being a good all-round infielder, fits in well at all positions.

In the outfield, Captain "Mike" Palm will be found in center field when the first game is played with Juniata on April fifth. "Mike" has been showing well since he came back.
