NOTED PROFESSOR JOINS PENN STATE FACULTY

graduate of Middlebury, leaving that institution with the class of 1896. He spent one year at Princeton and twelve more at the University of Chicago, teaching his favorite subject at the latter place. In 1912 he became the founder and director of Ecole du Chateau de Solvay, in France. He began giving instruction at the Middlebury summer sessions in 1911. After teaching for several summers he finally became a regular member of the Middlebury faculty in 1919.

The following year the French House was first opened and de Visme was made Dean of the French School. In this same year his services were recognized in a significant manner when he was made a Chevalier de la Legion d'Honneur. His style of teaching the French language, wherein the students live in one house and while abiding there use the French tongue, solely as well as following French customs in their living, has since been used as a pattern in several other colleges and universities, Penn State having been one of these since 1921.

A Popular Teacher

When Professor de Visme returned to Middlebury Summer Session to teach in 1911 there were but six enrolled in the French course. In 1919 at the summer term, there were fifty-one, a quarter of the total college attendance. In the summer of 1921 there were 294 French students, representing twenty-seven different states. This remarkable increase can be directly attributed to the efforts of M. de Visme who was popular while occupying the position of head French instructor at the Vermont college.

On signing from his office of Dean of the French School in February of this year because of illness, Professor de Visme, with his wife, left for Clifton Springs, where he is at present convalescing. Penn State officials got in touch with him and in the last few weeks were finally able to secure him for the coming summer term.

Wife Will Assist

Professor de Visme will be assisted by his wife and by other native French teachers in his work in the Nittany Valley this summer. His work here will be conducted in accordance with the methods, and under the conditions which have proved so successful at Middlebury. During the regular college session, the well known French pedagogy will undertake French instruction in the Department of Romance Languages, of which W. I. Foster is the head.
