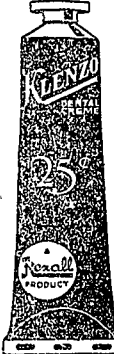

**RAIN DELAYS PRACTICE OF NITTANY STICKMEN**

**Yost Will Be Absent from First Game—Johnston Reports for Practice**

The first scrimmage of the season for the Penn State lacrosse team, which was scheduled for Saturday afternoon, was postponed on account of the rain and the muddy condition of the field. Instead of the proposed game the men were given about three hours of an hour of intensive work.

The hardest problem which Coach Caldwell now is that of finding a man to play at the third defense position in the place of Yost, who will be absent on an inspection trip at the time of the first game. T. A. Murray '23 is showing up well at the goalkeeper post and "Barney" Wentz and "Andy" Shanci are playing a better game than they did last year.

The most important addition to the team this week was the receipt of Ray Johnston '26 who will devote his time to lacrosse instead of baseball. Several other new men have reported and the squad is showing plenty of enthusiasm—some of the men continuing their work after Coach Caldwell called the end of the season. Intensive practices with passing in front of the post and guarding have been the program of the past several days, and the stickmen are only waiting for open weather to develop their game through actual play.

In the first game of the Penn State tournament on Friday night, Homestead defeated Harriburg, Tech, 36 to 18. Campbell, McGill and Pfeiffer were the outstanding luminaries for the winning team while McLinn and Ross did the best work for Tech.

The Blue and Gold team had no difficulty in downing the Capital City five. It was only during the third quarter that Tech flashed any form and in this period it outscored Homestead 19 to 7.

**Johnstown Loses**

Johnstown was likewise compelled to be content with a third place rating after Nanticoke handed it a 46-29 defeat in the second game of the tournament. The game was again the bright light for the up-valley boys and ended ten field goals and five fouls during the evening.

Coach George Snell's team started off with a bang and threatened to capture the game in the first half. The led Nanticoke a merry race during the former Penn State football man's team first two periods and was leading 25 to 21 at the end of the half. Johnstown blew up however and scored but two points during the last two times. Coach McDermott's men flashed a brilliant attack in the second half and evened up matters by scoring 25 points, as many as were registered by Johnstown during the initial periods.

**Good Characterization and Clever Stage Setting Mark Production of Melodrama**

As their anniversary offering for this season, the Penn State Players presented "Loyalties." John Galsworthy's famous drama in the adaptation of Friday and Saturday evenings. The production of this well-known play carried the Players into a new field of endeavor and the dramatists were highly successful in portraying the various types of loyalties which Galsworthy had in mind when he wrote the drama.

Among the leading roles was that of Ronald Dancy, a soldier in the British Army. As played by F. D. Young '24 it was a splendid bit of acting and after the first scene he seemed to fall into the swing of his part with ease. As "Mad Dog" Miles M. of John Wright '27 took a leading part in a capable manner. Miss Wright's emotional acting in the third act after her husband had confessed to theft, was especially commendable.

To interpret the character of a person who belongs to a race not one's own is an exceedingly difficult task, for even a professional but F. S. Neumann '26 did this very thing to perfection. He was at his best in the third act. C. J. O'Donnell '25, as Charles Wilson, turned in his usual excellent performance and, along with F. J. Lamb '26, F. Hunter '25, M. Hous '26 and R. J. Shado '26.

Although appearing in minor roles, F. G. Huchler '24 and I. O. Bennett '25 deserve mention. The cast was completed by Miss Constancy Otton '24 as the young flapper, Mary Ferguson '24 as Lady Adelle, T. F. Lane '24, R. J. Lamb '26, F. Hunter '25, M. Hous '26 and R. J. Shado '26.
