 Several of the Trustees have said to me that no action taken by the Board in their experience has received more general or more favorable commendation on the part of the public, as indicated to them by many expressions of approval than this action with reference to student use of automobiles. **HONOR SPIRIT PLAN ACCEPTED BY STUDENTS AT BUCKNELL**  
 The general trend of student opinion at the University of Bucknell is favorable to the Student Honor Plan, according to the results of the ballot on March fourteenth when the proposals for a new examination system, closer co-operation between faculty and students and uniformity in the application of existing faculty rules were passed by a seventy-five per cent affirmative vote.  
 All proposals of the plan were accepted with the exception of one that suggested the limiting of the number of activities in which each student may participate. It was defeated by fifteen votes. In five sections the plurality was more than one hundred votes.

 Since against team play. Moving to ball two yards nearer the posts is a step in the right direction, however for the kicker will have to go further back to give necessary height to his boot, while the runner will have only three yards to go with the opposing secondary defense driven back by the threat of a pass.  
 Among the modifications wrought by the addition rules committee was the demand that shift plays come to a decided stop before the passing of the ball. The ruling has pluses of the Dartmouth shift type. "Bez" stated if it he was never in favor of the shift play and that it is not football. The committee also emphasized the lines regarding the interference by ineligible men on forward passes. "There is no offense there," said Bezdek. "The defensive men attempting to intercept the pass cannot be blocked by offensive players ineligible to receive it. In the excitement of the play the referee often cannot notice the foul and I think the promise of the fifteen yard penalty will straighten out the situation."
