**SUMMER SESSION SENDS BULLETINS TO TEACHERS**

graduate students. The bulletins describing the various courses have not yet been printed.

The session will begin on Saturday, July fifth and will end on Friday, August fifteenth. Students will be allowed to carry only six credits this summer.

Coch Blazek will head the department offering a special group of courses for athletic coaches and health specialists. The American Red Cross and the State Department of Public Instruction will assist in this work.

The French and Spanish departments will be reorganized and entirely under the direction of Professor De Visme of Middlebury College and Professor I. L. Foster. Dr. W. Holmes, head of the Mt. Vernon New York schools will have charge of courses in the superintending and supervision of schools.

In addition to these courses there will be a number of subjects that are offered during the regular college year. By special arrangement it will be possible for those who wish to devote all of their time to Chemistry, Physics, or Chemical Agriculture to complete a year's work in the summer session.
