TECHNICAL STUDENTS TAKE ANNUAL TRIPS

(Continued from first page) spent at the University of Columbia at different noted buildings, and at the offices of leading architects.

As in former years, the civil engineers will go West, visiting the Hydro-Electric plant at Warren's Bridge, the sewage and garbage works at Alton, and spending the rest of the week in Pittsburgh. The points of special interest in the show and water filters, the pumping station, and the rapid sand filters at McKeesport.

On Monday they will visit the Carnegie Steel Company and the Twentieth Street Bridge over the Allegheny river. One day will be devoted to the American Bridge Company and to the movable dam at Glen Osborne and a special train has been provided for the inspection of the belt railroad which serves the industries of Pittsburgh.

One of the newest plants of the Philadelphia Electric Company for the certification of the Pennsylvania Railroad and the Rocking Works for the manufacture of cables at Trenton will be included in the electrical engineers' trip. The details will also visit various power plants in New York City, the Interborough Railway and one day will be spent in the General Electric Works at Schenectady, New York.

The industrial engineers will spend the entire week in and around Philadelphia, where they will inspect the Westinghouse Electric Company, the Victor Talking Machine Company at Camden, the Miller Lock Company, the John Brommies and Sons, textile manufacturers, and other important industrial plants.

Five plants will be visited by the mechanical engineers, their headquarters and a more intensive study will be made of each. A number of new features have been arranged, including a special run to York, where they will inspect the new Hydraulic Company and the York Manufacturing Company. Thursday and Friday are to be devoted to Philadelphia, where, besides other important plants, they will visit the Auto Car Company which gives the college its new fire truck. Saturday will be spent in Trenton, New Jersey, and the remainder of the week will be devoted to plants in New Jersey, New York and Bridgeport, Connecticut.

The senior metallurgists, on their non-ferrous inspection trip will first visit the Robinson plant of the New Jersey Zinc Company, and from there will go to Philadelphia and visit the Six Metal Company as well as several other plants. Finally they will inspect the various important metallurgical works in and around New York.

Junior in the metallurgical school will spend their entire time visiting the Iron and steel plants of the Pittsburgh district and the junior mining engineers and geologists will spend their first week in the anthracite coal regions. This will be followed by a week's geological trip through the eastern part of Pennsylvania.

The following night, Friday the University of Indiana will be encountered at Bloomington, Indiana, with the same side of the question being upheld by Penn State. The Hoosier school will likewise supply no judges.

On Monday morning the debaters will continue their activities, at the Indiana State Agricultural College. At this place the affirmative side of the question will rest upon the visitors and the decision will be given by judges. The time of this meeting has been set for the morning because of the fact that the chapel attendance will be devoted to the debate, thus resulting in a large audience. The hour following the chapel period will be called off so that all will have ample opportunity for attending the debate.

Extemporaneous Debates

When Iowa State University is met at Iowa City on the night of Thursday, April twenty-fourth, the Lion organization will take part in an extemporaneous debate for the first time this year. The question for this meeting will be chosen by Professor E. L. Hunt, President of the Eastern Public Speaking Association and will be submitted to the librarian at the western institution. Twenty-four hours will be given to each team for preparation on this subject.

There are several interesting features about this debate. One of these is that the winner will be decided by the audience decision type of voting the debaters themselves taking part in the debate by asking questions of the upholders of each side. Another interesting part of this war of words will be that Penn State will give one man to the forums, while they will likewise allow one of their men to change sides.

The best debate of the trip will also be of the extemporaneous kind, being with Northwestern University on the evening of April twenty-sixth. The question at this place will be picked by either the University of Illinois or Chicago. The next day, Sunday, the local men will leave for Penn State arriving here on Monday, April twenty-eighth.

Student Coaches Susquehanna

Susquehanna University comes here with little known about her team. Dowsler, veteran first baseman from last year's nine which held Penn State in a score of 2-1, has been coaching the Orange and Maroon men this spring. The Susquehanna group opened their season against Bloomsburg on April eighth and then traveled to Huntington, where Jundt was met.

Coach Dowsler has had his greatest problem in overhauling catches and pitchers of varsity caliber. Captain Tokowicz will be found behind the bat and the veteran Clark will likely be the hurler. These two men are the only varsity hitters men from the team of last year that remain on the squad.

The infield will be fairly strong with Coach Dowsler himself at the infield slick and Bolig another veteran slated for the mid-way position. Thomas will likely cavort around the hot corner although his name at shortstop has not been definitely selected. The choice here lies between Jones of last year's Junior Varsity team and Miller from the 1923 varsity line.

The best men for the fielders' posts likewise have not been chosen. Gillett will probably be found occupying one of the positions while Constable, Swank, Young, Koek, Severson and Hamner have been fighting for the other two berths. As a whole the Susquehanna aggregation comes to Penn State with a well-balanced nine.

ALUMNI RADIO NIGHT IS INTRODUCED BY WPAB

Talks by "Prexy", Alumni President and Secretary and Bezddek Comprise Program

The first annual Penn State Alumni Radio Night was introduced last Wednesday by station WPAB. The program was featured by talks by the alumni president and secretary, President Thomas, Hugo Bezddek and the deans of the various schools of the college.

G. H. Dolke, alumni president and E. J. Sullivan, alumni secretary brought forth in their talks an appeal for more alumni to return for Alumni Day in June and told of the extensive preparations being made to make the celebration this year all others.

"Prexy" Speaks

President Thomas in his speech to the alumni said that there are two elements which have given Penn State the position in education that it has today. They are the constitution and fundamental law of the institution, and the callous of men who have served the college and have given their lives to make Penn State what it is today. He also stated that in his belief Penn State standards of education have not been lowered which is proved by the success of the alumni and the demand for graduates.

He went on to tell of the improvements and developments of Penn State and spoke of the plans for continued progress in the development of the many departments and in the strengthening of the teaching staff. Of the organization of the students by departments and courses, he said, "We have here at Penn State not an educational machine, but a real human organization, brothers older and younger, more experienced and less experienced, who are working together to discharge great public services in the fields of their respective interests. This makes for a wholesome life and worthy ideals throughout the whole organization."

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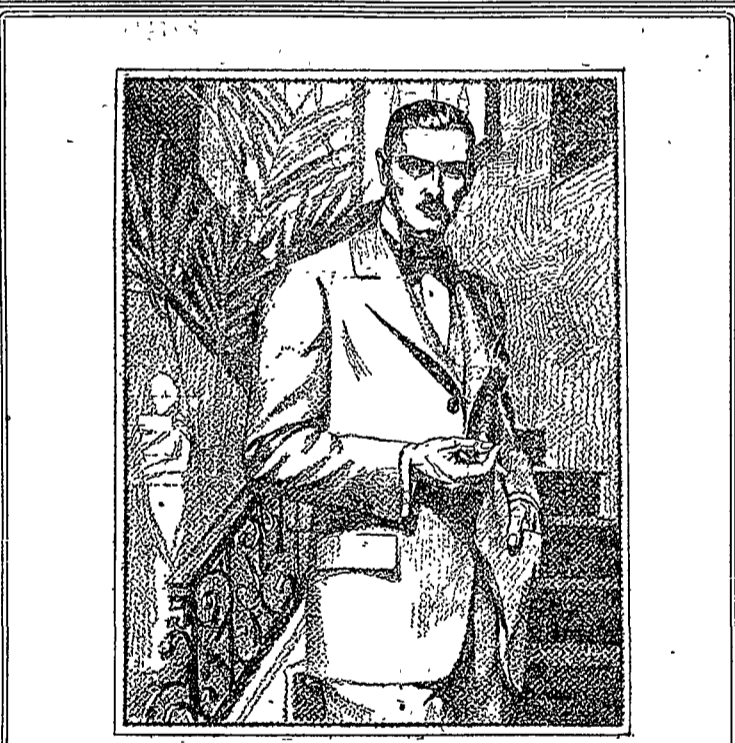
