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SPANISH CLUB PRESENTS LAST PROGRAM OF YEAR

Meeting Is Marked by Numerous Musical Numbers—Dances Are Well Executed

The Penn State Spanish Club under the direction of assistant professor of Spanish I Martinez presented its final program of the year in Old Chapel last Wednesday evening. The program was varied and interesting and the audience which attended the final meeting of the club crowded the main floor and balconies to capacity.

The meeting opened with several selections by the Symphonic Espinola under the direction of R. B. Smith '26 and its numbers at various times during the evening were beautifully applauded. Miss D. Heffernan and L. L. Kaufman presented a musical playlet which drew many laughs, and two lullaby songs in Spanish were given in clever style by Miss C. C. Cannon.

The mandolin quartette of the Penn State Mandolin Club drew repeated encores with a series of numbers played in excellent style. A sketch entitled "J. Ritas" was presented by W. McLaughlin, M. Dummell, and J. R. Toman. The following number, in which H. W. Johnson presented some clever cartoons, was repeatedly applauded.

Seven dances were presented during the program and these claimed the most attention from the audience. The outstanding dance of the evening was done by Miss M. L. Ritchie and R. R. Kelly and the encores for all the dancers were most enthusiastic. The studentina Espinola, composed of forty students from the courses in commercial Spanish presented a series of comic songs under the direction of A. C. Lowery '26. Their work was one of the distinct hits of the evening, although the entire program was well done and enthusiastically received.

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
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
