## NEW HEAD ASSIGNED TO MILITARY DEPARTMENT

Lieutenant Colonel McLaughlin Succeeds Captain Feibiger as Commandant

Beginning with the fall term in September, Penn State will have a new professor of Military Science and Tactics in the person of Captain McLaughlin. Lieutenant Colonel of Infantry, now on duty at a Government School at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. Lieutenant Colonel McLaughlin will replace Captain George L. Feibiger as Commandant of the Military Department at Penn State.

The new commandant has made an enviable record since his enlistment as a private in September, 1897. He served through the Spanish-American War, being successively promoted to corporal, sergeant, and second lieutenant. He was commissioned as a First Lieutenant in June, 1901, and as a Captain in 1911. Serving through the World War as a temporary Major and Lieutenant Colonel, he was elevated to the position of full Major in September, 1917, and to that of Lieutenant Colonel in July, 1920.

Captain Feibiger, who has been in command of the cadets for the past year, will attend camp at Camp Meade this summer, and in the fall will report to the Infantry School at Fort Benning, Georgia.

## LION NETMEN WIN BUCKNELL MATCH

Fast Games on Muddy Courts Result in 4-2 Victory for Nittany Team

### CONTEST IS CUT TO SIX MATCHES BY DARKNESS

Defeating the Bucknell netmen for the first time in six years, the Penn State tennis team won by second meet of the season 4 to 2 Saturday afternoon on the Armory courts. Due to the muddy condition of the courts it was expected that the meet would be called off but before four o'clock the field of action had dried to a sufficient degree to make playing possible.

Contrary to previous reports Bucknell brought but a five men team and five singles and two doubles matches were planned. However, after six matches had been played, the remainder of the meet was called off on account of darkness.

In the first match of the afternoon, C. L. Guther '25 displayed invincible form and easily defeated Johnson of Bucknell in straight sets 6-3 and 6-0. Captain Laws of the Blue and White team, met a later in Captain McLaughlin losing 1-6 4-6 and McCaskey of the Lewisburg aggregation outplayed J. S. Webster '24 for a 6-2 and 6-3 win.

In the most hotly contested match of the meet Guther and J. M. Price '26 the Lion doubles combination came from behind after losing the first set, and took the next two sets from McLaughlin and McCaskey 6-4, 6-1. Tennis and football court generalship marked the playing of both teams, and it was only in the last set when the Nittany players broke through McCaskey's service that victory was assured.

## FRATERNITY TRACKMEN STAGE MEET TOMORROW

Contest Called at Four-thirty on New Beaver—All Freshmen Are Eligible

The annual inter-fraternity and inter-unit track and field meet will be staged on New Beaver Field tomorrow afternoon at four-thirty o'clock. All fraternities and units that have men in other track or field events are urged to make entries and contenders who are applicants for varsity letters will be given a chance to display their wares.

All entries for the meet will be made on the field thus eliminating the necessity of preparing lists of contestants before the meet. All fifteen events of a regulation track meet will be run if provided there are contestants. Both teams will compete in each event before proceeding to the next on the schedule, but the unit and fraternity winners in each event will not meet.

Any man who enters the meet may compete in only three events. No man who has scored a point in any varsity event may enter tomorrow's meet, but any freshman is eligible whether or not he is on the varsity list. The meet will begin promptly on time in order to finish all events, and any man who is not on his mark at the last call will be left out of the race.

Coach Cattmell is anxious to make this year's meet a success and urges all fraternities and units to enter teams. Men who show up well in the events of the afternoon will be looked over by the Nittany coaches, and one of the motives in holding the meet is in the hope of discovering new material for the varsity track squad.

## PENN STATE NINE FACES WEST VA. WESLEYAN TODAY

Visitors Were State Champions Last Year—Game Called at Four-twenty

### BUCKNELL DEFEATS LION IN WEEK-END ENCOUNTER

Costly Errors Cause Nittany Defeat—First Northern Trip Game Thursday

In an endeavor to shake off the fielding slump which crippled them in the 5-3 game lost to Bucknell last Saturday, the Penn State baseball team will tackle the West Virginia Wesleyan team this afternoon on New Beaver Field at four-thirty o'clock. This contest is the last one that will be played on the home grounds until the two-game series with Union's on May thirtieth and thirty-first.

A slight personal touch is attached to the West Virginia institution for it is at that college that "Bob" Higgins, famous All-American end on Penn State's 1919 grid team is now his football coach. Ross, a graduate of the Buckhannon institution is coaching the line drill team and is also chief assistant to Higgins in the fall. While an undergraduate, Ross was a member of the football eleven, playing in Wesleyan's last gridiron engagement with the Nittany Lion in 1916. The Blue and White won this contest in the last few minutes of play, the final score being 8 to 7.

### State Champs Last Year

The Orange and Black nine was the champion of the state of West Virginia last year, going through its season undefeated. Only two victims are left from last year's outfit however, these men being Captain Knight second baseman and Bullman left fielder. Around these other players, Coach Ross has built a combination of much promise.

Knight is playing his third and last season of collegiate baseball, leading the diamond team, he captained the basketball five and also earned his letter in football, making him a three-letter man. Bullman was recently elected to head the 1923 football eleven and will likewise be a member of a piece on the line this year next winter. The remainder of the nine will be made up largely of freshmen, whose worth is not fully known yet.

Heuten by Carnegie Tech Opening this season with the Carnegie Tech slugger, the Orange and Black twelve were trailed in the dust when the Tartans annexed a 7-2 win over their rivals. The second tilt with the Pittsburgh club resulted in an eleven-inning tie game, eight runs having been scored by each side. The Buckhannon Independents were next taken on and they were finally downed after an exciting fight, by a count of 11 to 12. West Virginia University was next met and the Morgantown institution received the verdict by a 12-2 decision. State College proved easier to solve, however, as a 9 to 6 victory was gained in the meeting with her representative.

### Tar Wins Again

Alon Tarr, captain of the East Penn nine, pitched his team to victory last Saturday in the last game that he will ever pitch for his Alma Mater against Penn State. The winning slugging was aided for ten blows, while his teammates punched out but nine singles from the delivery of Tomahawk. ## POOR WEATHER DELAYS WORK ON VARSITY HALL

The new track house is being covered by a slate roof and the interior, when completed, will have marble floors and walls. All modern conveniences are being installed in the new building, and it promises to be the most up-to-date structure on the campus.
