

### HARRISBURG TECH TRACK STARS WIN SCHOLASTIC MEET

#### Capitol City Lads Gain Third Consecutive Victory—Take White Trophy Permanently

#### BELLEFONTE ACADEMY PLACES CLOSE SECOND

#### Six Interscholastic Records Fall Saturday—Welch Captures Scoring Honors

Six scholastic records were shattered on New Beaver field Saturday afternoon when Harrisburg Tech captured first place in the fifteenth annual interscholastic track and field meet with a total of twenty-six victories, exactly one point more than Bellefonte Academy, second place, scored East Pottersford, New Jersey, and Ford City High Schools were tied for third place while Delaware, New York High School with but one entry, took fifth place with a total of eleven points.

Welch, Bellefonte Academy star, was high scorer with twenty points, as a result of first places in the broad jump, javelin throw, shot-put and discus throw. In the javelin throw, the Centre County lad hurled the spear 177 feet, 6 inches beating the mark of 152 feet, set by Trent of Mercersburg Academy three years ago. Stepping in the circle for the discus throw, Welch again broke a record as the oval fell 120 feet, 9 and 2-5 inches from the circle.

#### Welch Breaks Record

Bellefonte Academy came in for its share of record breaking Saturday afternoon, Welch causing the twelve-pound hammer mark to fall by the hours when he hurled the ball for a distance of 178 feet, 6 inches. The former record was 161 feet, 4 inches. Tenack of Huntington, New York, High School set a new mark in the 220-yard dash, stopping the distance in 22, 7-10 seconds, while Walter Burris, Harrisburg Tech luminary, broke the tape in the 440-yard dash in 52, 7-10 seconds, shattering the old record by a tenth of a second.

The mark in the one-mile relay was lowered by Dickinson Seminary, the Williamsport lads doing the distance in 3 minutes, 37 seconds, bettering the old record by three seconds. Woolley, the Delaware entry, displayed great form in the century dash when he nosed out Hancock of Huntington, New York, by a fraction of an inch. Woolley also took second places in both the high and broad jumps. Bill Boyd, carrying West Philadelphia's colors, gave his school ten points as a result of first places in the 120 and 220-yard hurdles.

#### Half-Milers Good

Fans found the most sensational race of the afternoon in the half-mile run when Welch, of Ford City broke the tape less than a foot ahead of Burris, the Tech leader. At the crack of the gun, Rex of Juniata stepped into the lead and held the pace for the first lap. Tired by his efforts, however, he dropped back into third place and Welch took the lead with Burris close on his heels. Cheered by his teammates, Burris let forth a burst of speed, similar to the one that carried Tech's relay team to a victory at the Penn Relays this year, and pulled up on even terms with Welch. With but

ten yards to go and with both men turning neck and neck, the Ford City entry let go with a terrific sprint that carried him to victory.

Sensational of Altoona had things his own way in the mile run, coming in twenty yards ahead of his nearest rival. Walter of Patton, Altoona of East Pottersford, New Jersey, High School repeated his last year's performance when he took first place in the two-mile run, nosing out Cornell of Harrisburg Tech. Miller of Mount Union High School took first place in the high jump, ascending 5 feet 6 inches while Kennedy of Jersey Shore High captured first place in the pole vault with a distance of 9 feet 4 inches.

### NITTANY GOLFERS BREAK EVEN ON WESTERN TRIP

#### Downed by Pitt Linksmen 8-4 and Score Win Over W. and J. in Week-end Matches

On their western trip over the weekend, the Penn State golf team split even, winning their match with Washington and Jefferson by a score of 8-2 and dropping the Pitt encounter with a 5 to 4 tally.

The match with the Smoky City lads played over the Stanton Heights course on Friday was featured by brilliant club work of both teams. Both won two matches apiece, but the Gold and Blue players took their matches with lower scores and nabbed the victory. Captain "Denny" Kline, slightly off form in his putting, was taken over, 3 and 2, by Canon of Pitt. Both also dropped three points for the Blue and White, being headed in the start by a pit of birdies by King. The next two matches went to Penn State, Gehard scoring two points to Captain Laney's one while Ike rang up the same amount over Zimmerman. Throughout the matches ends were close and totals low, though the course was heavy.

#### W. and J. Taken Over

In the W. and J. match on Saturday morning, the Penn State linksmen gave their opponents a clean-cut defeat. Captain Kline took three even points from Captain Haddon, playing a bang-up game. With low match score, succeeded in adding two more points to the Lion collection when he edged out Fulton, while Gerhardt rang up three more points, putting Wright McClure, runner-up in the Junior Amateur Championship of Pennsylvania, out of the scoring, three and one.

In the final match, Dce won the first nine holes one up and lost the second one down, making the ends even for the eighteen and adding a point to the scores of both teams.

On Saturday Penn State will send a twelve-man team to Williamsport for a contest with the Williamsport Country Club. The final line-up for the match will not be decided until the day before the meet.

### D. U. WINS ANNUAL GREEK TRACK MEET

#### Beta Theta Pi Takes Second Out of Twenty-one Entries—Few Units Compete

#### T. E. MATHIAS '27 WINS HONORS AS HIGH SCORER

In one of the hottest-fought interscholastic track and field meets staged in recent years, Delta Upsilon with thirty-one and three-fourths points, nosed out the Beta Theta Pi cinder team by a margin of four and one-half points last Thursday afternoon. Twenty-one fraternities scored points in the meet, Sigma Nu, with twenty-four points, Delta Sigma Phi, with nineteen and three-quarters, and Phi Sigma Kappa, with eighteen, being the other high scorers.

#### Mathias Is Star

Taking firsts in the hundred and two-hundred and the broad jump, "Ted" Mathias, a yearling, ran up the greatest number of individual tallies in the meet, taking almost half of the points credited to Delta Upsilon. He paced off the hundred in 10 and 1-5 holding by a close margin. Rosenberger, Phi Sigma Kappa, and Davies, Delta Sigma Phi. The same pit gave him a tight race in the 220, run in 22 and 1-5 seconds. Guller and Munn also took first places for the D U organization, in the high jump and discus respectively.

Sanford and Reed were the Beta Theta Pi men taking firsts in the 220 hurdles and the hammer, while Aitch carried off firsts in the javelin and shot-put for Sigma Nu. Costello, Phi Sigma Kappa, marked up five points for his team by running away with the 120 hurdles while in the one-mile event Stewart captured first place for the Phi Deltas.

Fountain, Sigma Pi, and Busching, Delta Sigma Phi, hung up quarters for their teams in the two mile and 110 yard and Kittle, Kappa Sigma broke the tape for first place in the half mile. The honors for the pole vault were tied between Combs, Theta Xi, and Lech, Beta Theta Pi, it nine-six.

#### Few Unit Entries

Few close heats marked the unit events run off at the same time as the fraternity contests. On Unit 24, was the high score, hanging up first places in the 100, 220 and 410. Levman and Renner also registered markers for the unit. Muntorf took two first places for Unit 27, the 220 hurdles and the pole vault.

#### Annual Convention of Engineering Extension Leaders Ends Friday Night

#### PROMINENT INDUSTRIES ARE WELL REPRESENTED

The ninth annual Engineering Extension Convention was held at Penn State on May fifteenth and sixteenth for the purpose of bringing the engineering students into closer relations with the present-day industrial conditions.

The convention was opened at nine o'clock Thursday morning with an informal meeting by Professor Miller of the Penn State engineering faculty. This was followed in turn with "The Selection of Apprentices" by W. G. Mann of the New Jersey Zinc Company, "Theoretical Instruction for Apprentices" by R. F. Croy of the Westinghouse Electric Company, "Vitalized Teaching Methods" by N. D. Hubbel of Penn State, "Wage Scales" by P. E. Wakefield, Carnegie Steel Company, and the "A. S. M. E. Investigation of Apprentice Training" by R. L. Sackett, dean of the School of Engineering at Penn State.

Thursday afternoon the session was opened with a formal meeting by Prof. Thomas. The main topic of the afternoon was "The Training of Economists to Industrial Employers" and the topic was discussed from the viewpoint of both employer and worker. The employers' attitude was represented by D. S. Spinks and R. S. Binkard and the workers' attitude by J. B. Daboul and W. H. Doyce.

Thursday evening was taken up by a dinner at the University Club featuring talks by M. P. Lambert, Major J. S. Richardson, E. Duna, and C.

### Friday Sessions

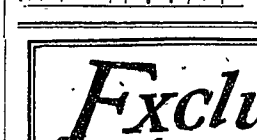
