during the past year. With the proposed twenty-five million dollar bond issue for the purchase of additional state forest reserves as the main topic of discussion in the Council will hold its general business session at eleven o'clock. The bill providing for the issue must be passed by the Legislature at its next session and finally ratified by the voters of the state before it becomes effective. It calls for the purchase by the state of over three million acres of forest now in the hands of private owners. At present the state owns approximately one million acres of reserves. According to one of its members, one of the chief purposes of the Council this year is to insure the ratification of the bill by bringing the importance of a permanent timber supply to the voting population through the medium of widespread publicity. Grant Hoover, of Williamsport, is chairman of the special committee which is handling the bill.
