Dance Are Among Attractions Scheduled

Armory Decorations To Be Blue
and White—Dance Is All-
College Affair

"It's coming Memorial Eve" is the slogan for the Informal May Hop which will be held in the Armory Thursday evening. The members promise to make this affair the crowning feature of the club's social activities of the year.

Tickets for the production were placed on sale the latter part of last week and it is expected that a large crowd will witness the showing.

"Captain Applejack" is a three act play and although the scenes are laid in England it is of the American type of humor. The characters are interpreted their parts in an excellent manner—the result of the many rehearsals held during the past month and the comedy is certain to meet the approval of the audience.

One of the outstanding features is the work of Lynn Bates, who plays the part of Aunt Valeska, a young adventuress who poses as a Russian spy. Miss Bates interprets some good comedy acting in the second act when she is taken prisoner on the pirate ship of Captain Applejack. This is the same part in which Mary Nash scored a big hit in the professional showing. Miss Bates is familiar to Penn State students through her part as the "Secret of the Nile" and "Honor Bright".

This is the first year with the Penn State Players for Levy who has scored successive hits in "Faithful," "Caste" and several other productions. In addition to appearing in the play, Levy has also been in charge of designing some clever and original sets for the commencement show.

In its sixth match of the season, the Penn State tennis team defeated Juniata College 5-1 last Friday afternoon.

Coach Ham picked a team composed of all sophomores to try them out in advance for next year's combination.

Although Juniata brought a five man team, only four singles and two doubles matches were played. The Nittany team consisted of but four players three of whom made the trip last week to the Mid-west.

J. R. Eggleston '26 playing number one for the Lion opposition, had little trouble with his adversary, defeating him in straight sets and allowing him but three games.

Short talks will be given by representatives of the G. A. R., the Episcopalian, American War Veterans and the D. A. V. The past year will have representatives from the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion. Revell and Lips in keeping with the day will be sounded in addition to the regular musical selections. The musical numbers will be presented by Mrs. C. P. Manquett, Mrs. Parks Wagner, Mrs. C. E. Grier, Mrs. W. P. Latta and Mrs. Minshall. A male quartet will also render a few selections. With the conclusion of this program, WPAB will sign off for the season.

FRATERNITY PRESIDENTS TO MEET ON THURSDAY

Get-together at Phi Kappa Sigma
Intended To Promote House
Party Cooperation

In accordance with the resolution passed several weeks ago by the Inter-Fraternity Union and Inter-Mutual Councils the presidents of all of the fraternities at Penn State will meet on Thursday night at six forty-five at the Phi Kappa Sigma house.

The resolution, one of the several submitted to the Senate Committee on Student Welfare which was indirectly responsible for the tabling of the recommendation of the committee abolishing June house parties, calls for a conference of fraternity presidents each year before June house parties.

The problem of under-the-table visiting will be the most important subject for discussion at the conference on Thursday night, according to Buck Taylor, president of the Inter-Fraternity Council who will preside over the meeting. Various phases of the house party problem in general are also slated for attention including the enforcement of the closing hours for dances during the period, adherence to the ruling recently passed regarding three chapters, and the question of cutting down expenses on out-of-town orchestras and elaborate favors.

According to the chairman, the meeting will be held in a spirit of cooperation among the chapter presidents rather than a business session and it is not expected that dramatic action on the questions will take place.

Assembling on Holmes Field for the Annual Field Day, the R. O. T. C. Regiment will be reviewed by Major-General Charles H. Muir of the Third Corps Area on Thursday afternoon at two o'clock. The next morning at eight thirty o'clock the cadet regiment will assemble to take part in the parade of patriotic organizations and also to participate in the Memorial Day exercises.

Members of the cadet regiment will assemble at Holmes Field without arms on Thursday at one forty-five o'clock. Upon the completion of the field exercises a blast of the bugle will be sounded which will serve as the signal for the regiment to report to the gun room where the cadets will secure their arms and form in proper company on the parade grounds west of the University tennis courts. The regiment will then be marched to Holmes Field as soon as it is formed by the cadet colonel.

DATES SET FOR RETURN OF MILITARY UNIFORMS

Property Must Be Turned in at
McAllister Hall—Rebates To
Start June Second

In compliance with the orders from the Purchasing Agent of the college, Captain G. L. Fisher of the Military Department requests that all students having in their possession United States property and uniform clothing return the articles on the following dates:

1. Cadet officers and members of the Penn State Band will return property at the military storeroom, McAllister Hall on Saturday May thirty-first between the hours of nine and twelve in the afternoon. Officers will be notified to return shoulder insignia if well as all other property which has been issued to them and Band members will be required to return their new uniforms at the same time as the above date.

2. Students who have completed two semesters of R. O. T. C. instruction will return property at the same place mentioned above on the following dates: Monday, June 2, nine to twelve a. m. and two to five p. m.; Tuesday, June 3, nine to twelve a. m. and two to five p. m.; Wednesday, June 4, nine to twelve a. m. and two to five p. m.

3. Students who have completed two semesters of R. O. T. C. instruction and all others, will return property at the same place mentioned above, on the following dates: Thursday, June 5, nine to twelve a. m. and two to five p. m.; Friday, June 6, nine to twelve a. m. and two to five p. m.; Saturday, June 7, nine to twelve a. m. and two to five p. m.

The property returned by the students must be in a condition suitable for acceptance, and will not be accepted unless its condition is such that it can be placed back in stock or sent away for reclamation, and under no circumstances will property be accepted which is not the property of the United States. In order to expedite the return of this property, a strict compliance with the above mentioned orders is requested. The College Treasurer will not be able to start paying rebates on military deposits until Monday, June second, 1924.
