

LION NET TEAM TO MEET PITT FRIDAY

Racqueters Line Up Against Panthers on Armory Courts at Four O'clock

TEAM TO BE SELECTED TOMORROW AFTERNOON

In their final match of the season, the Blue and White netmen will meet the aggregation from the University of Pittsburgh Friday afternoon at four o'clock on the Armory Courts.

Penn State will use either a four or five-man team against Pitt, but the lineup will not be decided until tomorrow.

Pitt is strong. Pitt is credited with having a strong combination, according to reports received from several of the Blue and White racqueters who witnessed the Blue and Gold in action while stopping on in Pittsburgh after the western trip.

Friday's match was to be a return encounter for Penn State, but an account of Pitt cancelling last Thursday's contest because of excessive rain in Pittsburgh, this will be the first meeting of the old rivals this year.

So far this season the Nittany tennis team has made one of the best showings that has ever been made by a similar Penn State combination.

In the first match of the season, Duquesne was easily overcome, but in the next meet the Blue and White combination was hard pushed to defeat Bucknell for the first time in four years.

PROFESSOR ORTON AIDS EXPERIMENTAL WORK ON APPLE CROP PROTECTION

Professor C. R. Orton of the Penn State Botany Department returned last week from a trip to the Field Laboratory of Plant Pathology at Ardmore in Adams County, where he worked in cooperation with the Corn Protection Institute on experiments in the control of apple scab and fire-blight by the use of spray materials.

Penn State's cooperation with the Corn Protection Institute enables the college to test out some of the latest discoveries in the field of spray materials. Some of these tests, notably those with colloidal and precipitated sulphur, appear to be of value in checking the disease.

PITT WILL OPPOSE NITTANY TRACKMEN

Panther Aggregation Brings Stars in Field—Events Timed for One-thirty Saturday

COMING MEET IS LAST OF SUCCESSFUL SEASON

In the final home meet of the season the University of Pittsburgh track team will encounter the Penn State under aggregation on New Beaver Field at one-thirty o'clock Saturday afternoon.

Strongest among the western contestants will be Robusch, of Penn Relay fame, Conbett, Johnson and Bohren Champion in the Philadelphia carnival and consistently clearing the bar at six feet or better, Robusch will be a favorite in the high jump and among the leaders in the pole vault.

Conbett will probably be entered in the mile, and on a favorable track the Panther runner will clock a speedy pace. Among the leading sprint entries is Bohren, noted football man, and in both track and field events the Pittsburgh aggregation promises some good material.

Coch Cartmell plans to enter a large Penn State team on Saturday and some of the "comers" on the cinder track will be seen in action.

In the field Tork and Palm will throw the hammer, and Michalske will throw the discus and heave the shot.

Wagner and Heckel are likely entries in the high jump, Russell, Moore and Dierley will try in the broad leap, and the pole vault will include Pate, Durbin and Montgomery.

F. F. KERNAN '24 OBTAINS KLOPP MEMORIAL REWARD

F. F. Kernan '24, of Pittsburgh, has been awarded a prize of ten dollars in gold for excellence in Horticulture.

The prize was recently established by Dr. Henry I. Klopp of Allentown for that student who excels in the four year course in Horticulture.

Dr. Klopp founded the award in memory of his son, Russell Edwin Klopp, who was appointed to the position of Graduate Assistant in Plant Pathology by the Horticultural Department at Penn State, but who met death by a fatal fall a few days before he was expected to assume his duties at the opening of the present college year.

HUNDRED NEW POSITIONS OPEN IN PATENT OFFICE

Examinations Are Scheduled for Next Week—Good Salaries Offered Employees

The United States Civil Service Commission states that it will hold an examination on June fourth and fifth to fill one hundred newly-created positions of assistant examiners in the United States Patent Office.

The time required for taking this examination has been reduced from three to two days. The examination includes mathematics, technical physics, interpretation of mechanical drawings, and some branches of engineering.

The magnitude of the work of the Patent Office is indicated by the fact that fifty of the ninety-one linotype machines used in the Government Printing Office are kept constantly busy on Patent Office work.

Entries From Other Classes Are Completely Outclassed by Large Yearling Squad

In the inter-class track meet held on New Beaver Field last Wednesday afternoon, the freshman under squad ran away with everything but the water buckets and scored 19 points, against 2 for the sophomores runners.

Kettle '27 ran the half mile in 2 minutes 5 1/4 seconds with a comfortable lead over C. J. Decker '27 who finished second. C. D. Decker '27 placed third and T. W. Palmer '27 took third in the two mile. K. R. Whitson '24 placed fourth in the hammer event, and C. M. Gault '25 completed the apparatus scoring with a fourth place tie in the high jump.
