King, number two man on the Pitt team, has been elected to lead the Panther floor team for next year while Gehardt will pilot the Nittany five through the 1925 campaign. The Lion team met the Washington and Jefferson representatives on the college course last Saturday afternoon and when the players had emerged from the eighteenth green Coach Rutherford's men were on the home end of a 7-0 score. Kindt and Bitt gave their team three points when each man won single matches and also capped the four-ome with Captain Haddon and Walton. The score of the four-ome was 1 and 3 while Kindt was a winner, 6 and 5, as was Bitt, 3 and 1.

Gehardt and Ego clashed with Bradford and Shubs of the Red and Black team and turned in two points when they won the four-ome and Ego captured his match. Gehardt played his single match with Bradford, turning up in the Western Pennsylvania Junior championships last year, and at the sixteenth hole, he was two up and two to go. Bradford drove off to the seventeenth green and came within a few feet of the green. His pitch carried him to within a short distance of the pin and he sank his putt for a birdie 3, while Gehardt was taking a put. On the eighteenth hole, Bradford managed to have the match when he again dropped one in the cup for another birdie 3.

Greens Poor
Poor greens hindered the players to some extent and the putting of every man was far below par. However, "Ed" Ego seemed to get started in his putting after the second hole and returned in a 1 and 3 victory over his opponent, Shide. Several others are working on the course at the present time in order to get it into good shape for Saturday's match with Pitt.
