 that time very hostile to the United States.

After subduing the tribes of Samar, he was stationed at Fort Logan, Colorado, again going to the Philippines in 1909, being in service against the Hulo Moros on the island of Mindanao, receiving a commission as Captain at that time. He returned to Vancouver Barracks, in Washington, serving as regimental adjutant, and post adjutant.

In 1915, he was selected by the Governor of Oregon as Colonel of the Infantry, being authorized by the War Department to accept the commission. He took his regiment to the Mexican border in 1916, having command of all the troops on the border of Southern California with headquarters at San Diego. Having completed four years of detached service from the regular army, he was sent to Fort Bliss, Texas.

**Service in World War**  
 When war was declared on Germany, he was ordered to Fort Logan as instructor of the first officers training camp, then being detailed as Senior Instructor at Camp Leon Springs in February 1918, he was appointed as Inspector General, being stationed at Washington, D. C. After the Armistice was signed he was sent to Brest, France, as Inspector General of the 5th section at the same time receiving a promotion to Lieutenant Colonel. He was later detailed as instructor of the Massachusetts National Guard, until 1923, when he was sent to Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, to take a course at the Command and General Staff school, graduating in June 1924. He will assume his duties as Professor of Military Science and Tactics, at the Pennsylvania State College, when college opens in September.

#### POTATO BLIGHT MAKES APPEARANCE IN PENNA.

Late blight, one of the most destructive potato diseases, has made its appearance in Pennsylvania. The first occurrence in the state was noted recently in a field near Johnstown in Cambria county.

The season thus far, with its abundance of moisture and cool weather, has been ideal for the spread of the disease. It is probably present in many localities of the state at the present time. Plant pathologists at the Pennsylvania State College are urging continuous and efficient spraying, especially in wet weather, as the one means of warding off a destructive epidemic. More than 23,000 acres were sprayed last year with an average increase of yield per acre of 28 bushels. About 4,000 farmers in the state found spray the most effective means of lowering their cost of production and thus increasing their profits from "spuds" in 1923.

#### BERRY DISEASE

A winning fight against diseases of raspberry plants is being staged by growers with the cooperation of extension plant disease specialists from the Pennsylvania State College. Last year these diseases developed quite seriously. The college men supervised the "roguing" out of diseased plants in seven large patches over the state, and plantings from these practically disease-free patches are now being grown and carefully watched in twenty-five counties of Pennsylvania.

The most serious of the diseases attacking the raspberries are Eastern Blue Stem, Mosaic and Leaf Curl. The college extension men caution growers of raspberries to cut out and destroy all parts of plants that show these diseases.
