YEARLING GIRLS NUMBER ONE HUNDRED AND TEN

Customs for Freshmen Are Made Lighter—May Have No Dates for Next Two Weeks

They are good-looking girls, but, like other groups of freshmen co-eds, they are green, as the newly adopted arm band indicates.

Latest figures given out by the Dean of Women have the number of yearling women as one hundred and ten. The total number of new girls is swollen to one hundred and fifty by the addition of forty students from other institutions of higher learning.
