NITTANY FRESHMEN ARE STUNT NIGHT VICTIMS OF SOPHOMORES

MOLASSES, SAWDUST, TOMATOES, WATER AND PADDLES ARE AMONG FAVORS GIVEN TO YEARLINGS AT THIRD ANNUAL CELEBRATION

Molasses, sawdust, dye, greased pig, juicy tomatoes, water and paddles! These were the favors presented to a thousand freshmen by almost as many sophomores last evening during the third annual celebration of Stunt Night at Penn State.

At the siren call of the fire whistle at seven-thirty o'clock, the second year men began forming the yearlings into line in each of the six sections into which the town was divided. "All freshmen out" was the cry of the Class of 1927. "We love the sophomores; we want our milk," was the response of the Class of 1928.

Escorted by the sophomores, paddles in hand, the first division of the yearlings had made their way to Adams Field, the scene of the festivities, shortly after eight o'clock. As the groups came on the field they were confronted with a bucket filled with dye into which each freshman was required to dip his hand. "To show up the ones we missed," was the explanation of Leroy Nelson '27, chairman of the committee in charge.

Massed in a great circle around the fire, one of the largest in recent years, the kneeling first-year men then saluted the flames, bowing their heads to the ground in the Oriental salami, the fire acknowledging the tribute with a roar. This rite concluded, a score of the men of '28 entertained their classmates with a free-for-all staged on a raised platform. A greased pig next performed, threatening to escape excitedly before being finally worn down by his pursuers by a squealing submission.

Novel Contests Incorporated in Stunt Night for the first time, three musical contests were then started. Two teams of ten yearlings each, five of whom rode on the shoulders of the others, engaged in a tilting contest, the tilting being done by means of long pig with paddles.

Girls' Campus Clubs SECURE FORTY PLEDGES About forty girls have accepted bid from the five campus clubs, Alpha, Alpha, La Comedore, Nita-Nee, and Sigma. The majority of these girls have been chosen from the Sophomore Class, as a girl is not eligible until she has been in college two semesters or a semester and a summer session. Last year the Campus Clubs Council (which is composed of three representatives from each club, and which outlines the policies of the clubs, inaugurated the system of "Professional Pledging" used this fall. By this method, a girl had the opportunity of listing the clubs in the order of her preference and sending this information to a disinterested party, who presented the names of those whom they might bid. The question of continuing this policy will be discussed at the next meeting of the Campus Clubs Council.
