This season Eastman has lost none of his old-time punting and the side of the line that B. College men who received honorable mention by Walter Camp last year will likely cause the Lion plenty of trouble tomorrow.
Strasser the Man
 Opposing "Mike" Mehdelski at guard will be Strasser, a team of the same physique as the Nittany line-backer, both players standing six feet high and tipping the beam at 155 pounds. In the event that Strasser fails to deliver the goods, Wood, who weighs 210 pounds and who is playing his first year on the varsity, will be sent in to fill the breach.
 Stauffer, the visitor's veteran quarterback, is Gettysburg's best bet at open-field running and taking back punts. However, Wood's former Philadelphia Central High School star, has been giving Stauffer a good battle for the regular quarterback post and it is probable that both men will see some action in tomorrow's encounter.
