work on the defense and by his punting.

In the first half, Buckley and Plock did good work for Penn State while Scully, diminutive Orange and Blue quarterback, and Emanuel were outstanding in the work of the visitors. Gettysburg uncovered a strong forward passing attack at the start of the game and this opened the Blue and White goal line at several stages.

Linesmen Show Up Well

McCann and Prevost, Penn State tackles, showed up well on the line when they scolded the Lion first team in the first. McCann was a continual menace to the Gettysburg backs as time and again he would back through the line and throw opponents on the floor. Penn State's interference in the latter stages of the game did not work so well as it did against North Carolina last Saturday, individual work on the part of Lion backfield ran long in a great measure, responsible for the consistent gains.

Lubitz received the kick-off in the first quarter and curled it back fifteen yards, being downed on the twenty yard mark. Three snappers at the line failed to gain and "Hank" sent a short punt to swab on the thirty-five yard line and the opposing back was brought to earth in his tracks. A forward pass Emanuel to Stuffer, carried the ball to the fifteen yard line and after three tries at the line had failed to give results, Stevens attempted a placement kick that went wide to the right. An exchange of punts followed and the visitors were in possession of the ball at midfield at the quarter ended. The second quarter was a repetition of the first Stevens missing another placement kick in this period.

First Team Goes In

When the whistle sounded for the beginning of the second half, the visitors' punters into the game. McCann's touchdown marked the only Lion score in this period. At the beginning of the fourth quarter, Gene Baker intercepted Emanuel's pass and carried it to the twenty yard line and the next play his brother "Bill" went around end for another touchdown. Prevost's spectacular play, which gave Penn State its third touchdown, came a few minutes later. Hebig received the next kick-off and in forty-five yards through a broken field before he was downed. A forward pass, "Bill" Baker to Gene Baker, carried the ball to the twenty yard line and the next play "Bill" Baker went through for a touchdown on the next play. The game ended a few minutes later.
