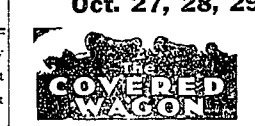
REEVES GOOD DROP-KICKER

No game was scheduled between the two institutions the following year but last season, hostilities were resumed when the Southerners invaded Penn State on Pennsylvania's Dixie Agria, the Lion triumphed, but this time only by the slight margin of one touchdown so, for the third battle, domestics figure that it is Tech's turn to come through.
