## I. F. C. DISCUSSES FRATERNITY SPORTS

### Coach Leonard Will Perfect System of Athletics Among Nittany Greek Letter Organizations

Inter-fraternity sports at Penn State received a much-needed impetus last Tuesday evening when Coach Leonard addressed the Inter-fraternity Council on this subject. The sentiment of the body was that all seasonal sports should be fostered among men outside the pale of varsity activities, and that this year inter-fraternity sports should take a prominent place as a medium to interest men in physical activities.

Coach Leonard spoke of his experiences at other colleges, and told of the success of sports among the Greek-letter organizations at those institutions. Since Penn State's number of fraternities is exceedingly large, and since the facilities for handling individual sports for Physical Education credit are limited, plans were spoken of which directly connect the fraternities with the Physical Education department in that freshmen and sophomores playing on the fraternities teams are to receive credit for appearing at the regularly scheduled gymnasium classes.

C. W. Taylor, president of the Council, appointed the following committee to act with Coach Leonard in working out a system of fraternities participation in athletics. Working basketball, baseball, tennis and golf. J. Gray '25, L. Tord '25, S. Keith '25, B. Durbin '25, T. C. Munnell '26, W. P. Remmer '25, and C. W. Taylor, ex-officio.

### Senior Week

The matter of Senior Week was brought before the Council for ratification and a roll call vote of all the fraternities indicated that the body as a representative group is in favor of Senior Week, and will back the idea to the limit.

A committee consisting of H. W. Kennedy, chairman, R. W. Tyson, T. H. Schmidt, M. J. Hoffman, C. M. Donohue, T. Moore '26, T. C. Zerby, and C. Cook '26, was appointed to carry over Penn State's program for the coming year. Much discussion preceded as to the participation of undergraduates in the final effort of the school year, and the committee will go to the Dean with this matter in mind.

## NOTED RUSSIAN SLATED TO ADDRESS STUDENTS

### Count Ilya Tolstol, Well-known Author, Will Give Lecture Tomorrow Night

Count Ilya Tolstol, the eloquent Russian author and lecturer will deliver his initial address to the Penn State student body tomorrow evening at seven forty-five o'clock in the Auditorium.

The lecture, "Leo Tolstol His Life and Literary Achievements," will be an interpretation of his father's Christian philosophy and ambitions. Every where his lectures were attended by large and enthusiastic audiences composed of people in all walks of life. He delighted everyone with his glowing discussion of Russian life and character. The nobleman has become famous throughout the world and especially in the United States as an interesting lecturer.

### Glowing Tribute

Count Tolstol's receptions in all parts of the country were so enthusiastic that the Macon, Georgia, "Daily Telegraph" has the following glowing tribute to pay him on his lecture there: "The sincerity, wisdom and noble thought that Count Tolstol radiated not only in his masterly lecture at Wesleyan Chapel, but also in conversations, made his visit in Macon epochal. He thoroughly believes in his father's philosophy of life and he feels himself under the high responsibility of picking up the torch where his father laid it down. As he put it himself in a spontaneous moment, there would be little use for a son's existence if he did not add something to what his father had done. Those who heard the Count's lecture were carried to the heights and depths to which few speakers are capable of leading. Those who have read from the pen of Count Ilya Tolstol cannot fail to recognize that he is one of the best minds of the world today."

## NITTANY DELEGATES TO GO TO FRATERNITY MEET

President John M. Thomas will represent Penn State at the sixteenth annual Inter-fraternity Conference to be held at New York City, November twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth. He will represent on the program in connection with the discussion of the report of the committee appointed last year to survey the comparative interests in the fraternities membership and attendance at the various colleges. Three hundred or more alumni representatives of the fifty-six national fraternities together with a number of college presidents and deans are expected to be present.

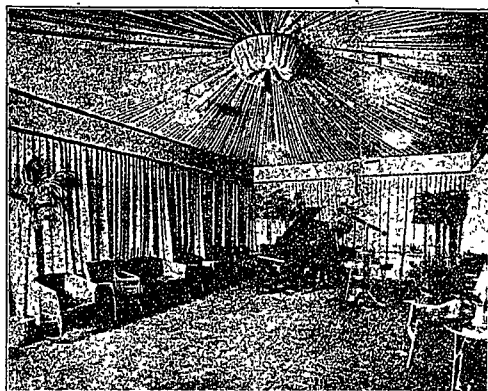
### Quantico Lads Meet Tartans Tomorrow After Five Days Practice Under "Bez"

## PENN STATE RADIO NIGHT IS MODIFIED

### First Half of Program To Begin at Ten-fifteen Eastern Standard Time

## PENN STATE BAND WILL BROADCAST AT MIDNIGHT

Announcement was made yesterday that it has been necessary to change the time of opening the program which will feature Penn State Radio Night next Wednesday at Station KDKA in Pittsburgh. The program has been split in two and the first half will start at ten-fifteen o'clock continuing for approximately a half-hour. No broadcasting will be done from eleven to twelve that night, as it has been set aside as the time to make transcontinental tests. All the large stations have consented to refrain from broadcasting during that quiet-hour. After it is over the second part of the Penn State program will be given.

The program for the first half of the evening has been tentatively set as follows:

Kenneth will also give a song during this part of the program. At midnight the Penn State Band will begin its program which was announced in a recent issue of the COLLEGIAN.

Broadcast in Philadelphia  
The Theatrical Quartet broadcast from Station WDR at 11:00 p.m. in Philadelphia on Friday evening before the Penn-Penn State game. Included among these selections was the number "No Neckin', No Muzzin'" which proved the most pleasing feature of the performance. In addition to the quartet, R. K. Hilchman, secretary to President Thomas, gave a talk on Penn State and there was also a song done by J. E. Kennedy '26. The Penn State part of the program lasted for a half-hour.

## BLAZE THREATENS BUSINESS DISTRICT EARLY YESTERDAY

### Spectacular Fire Razes Structure on Allen Street—Started in Coffee Urn

## POST OFFICE BUILDING DAMAGED BY FLAMES

### Local Firemen Limit Loss to Less Than Fifty Thousand—Was Partially Insured

One building, to the ground and seriously threatening the destruction of two others, the most spectacular fire witnessed since the memorable Horticulture Building blaze in 1921, early yesterday morning aroused many sleeping students from their slumbers and was the cause of attention for more than two hours while the flames were being subdued by the combined forces of the Student Volunteer Fire Company and the local town organization. Late yesterday afternoon the estimated loss was fixed at approximately \$50,000, most of which was covered by insurance.

## FACULTY VOTES AGAINST GRID CONTEST ON COAST

Deciding it inadvisable to make the trip this year, the Faculty Committee on Athletics voted that Penn State should not accept the University of Washington's invitation for a grid game at Seattle on December sixth. The action followed a brief discussion on the possibility of the proposed journey. In 1921 and 1922, the Nittany gridder appeared on the coast and their playing and clean sportsmanship resulted in another invitation this year. As the University of Missouri was also asked in the event that Penn State did not accept the invitation it is probable that the Western Conference team will oppose Washington on the offered date.

## Thirteen Luckless Yearlings Indicted by Tribunal for Breach of Customs

Thirteen "cruel" yearlings were indicted yesterday by a two-member tribunal of the Student Tribunal at last Wednesday evening in Room 114 of Main Street. Several signs were distributed among the rule-breaking yearlings and the heaviest punishment given during the session was that meted out to G. Pitterson '25.
