

### Blue and White Freshman Grid Team Closes Season With Decisive Victory.

One of the fastest and simplest freshmen eleven seen in Penn State in recent years finally closed its 1921 football season last Saturday afternoon on New Beaver Field, downing the Cadets Normal team by a 12 to 0 count. A perfect record was marked when the Panther cubs scored a win over the Blue and White veterans in Pennsylvania Day tilt.

Leading a call for candidates the week before the opening of college, this candidates reported to Coach Leonard for instruction before the close of the first week the number was led to six and under the designation of "Dutek," Hermann and "Diek," Schuster were put through stiff scrimmages.

#### Carnegie Tech Tilt

The Lion cubs opened their season by scoring a 21 to 7 win over the Carnegie Tech probe. The visitors showed a strong determination to prevent the Nittany veterans from scoring but the first quarter to the outcome of the clash was never in doubt. "Sammy" McLean, Harrisburg star scored the first touchdown and played a whirlwind of a game.

Coming through with a powerful diving attack the Blue and White veterans turned in a one touchdown victory over the routed Wyoming Seminary eleven at Kingston in second tilt. The team showed considerable improvement and penalties in the critical stages of the game prevented a larger score. "C" Lumsden and Dingfield starred in the backfield, tearing through the line for long gains.

Before a crowd of visiting alumni and students Coach Hermann's charges added covered fumbles by handling the strong kick eleven the worst doubling in nine years, downing the back and White by a 20 to 6 count. A spirited passing attack made possible the visitors lone tally. The Lion cubs seemed to have hit their stride and the contest was marked by team work and a snappy brand of playing.

#### Syracuse Ties

A costly fumble in the first quarter of the game cost the Penn State freshmen a win over the Syracuse five-year men when the two teams battled to a 6-6 tie in Poughkeepsie, N. Y. Loupk, who was sent in to replace Lumsden skidded the left end for the tying touchdown. Captain Green-shield's 11 tackle played a bang-up game and secured play after play in dangerous moments.

The playing of the Nittany freshmen in this tilt brought back memories of former Penn State teams, being characterized by powerful line smashing

coupled with hard blocking tackling and poorly open field running.

Receives Satisfactory

The Panther cubs in rough-shod over the Blue and White freshmen holding them to a 12 to 0 defeat. "Diek" Schuster's potshots supplied the home team with line smashing drives which netted them 374 yard passes. The 11 minutes showed grit and pep in the first quarter but from that time on there were signs of weakening and the Pitt lads had little trouble in coming through with a win.

As a fitting close of its season the 1921 cubs swapped the California tilt and by a six touchdown margin the line was able to string up 45 yards in this clash. Hermann's playing was satisfactory the former Pottsville punting a touchdown on the kick-off after a 100-yard run.

The work of the entire line was excellent, and proved the way for the cubs to play. Playing his first game showed wonderful possibilities and played a whirlwind in and of itself. The backfield came through with flashy runs and line backs which took the Normal lads by surprise.
