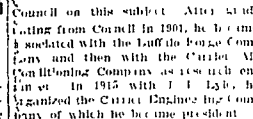
W. H. CARRIER TALKS TO ENGINEERS FRIDAY

Speaker is Chairman of National Research Council in Heat Transmission Field

W. H. Carrier, president of the Central Engineering Corporation of Newark, N. J. will be the speaker at the Engineering Lecture next Friday, at four o'clock. He will also speak to the students in the morning on the most specialized subjects.

As the chairman of the committee on the conditioning of the atmosphere of a room, Mr. Carrier will be the first to introduce of such into the room. Mr. Carrier accomplished one of the most important modern engineering improvements. He was also one of the first to provide practical commercial systems and machinery for the automatic control of relative humidity.

Mr. Carrier is now regarded as one of the leading authorities on heat transmission, and his knowledge in this field resulted in his appointment as Chairman of the National Research Council on this subject. After graduating from Cornell in 1901, he became associated with the Buffalo Forge Company and then with the Carrier Air Conditioning Company as its chief engineer. In 1915 with J. I. Lyle, he organized the Carrier Engineering Company of which he became president.
