

NITTANY HARRIERS END GREAT SEASON

Victory Over Champion Pitt Team Closes Most Successful Campaign in Years

FOURACRE TAKES THREE FIRSTS IN FOUR MEETS

A decisive victory over the Interstate championship Pitt harriers on Thanksgiving morning closed one of the most successful seasons that a Penn State cross-country team has ever known in years. In addition to Pitt, Alfred and Carnegie Tech fell before Coach Carnahan's protégés who, only a few weeks ago, were the champions of the Blue and White.

With but two veterans, Captain Decker and Danely, remaining from last year's varsity, a difficult proposition faced Coach Carnahan at the beginning of the season but the motto which he carried in the team's record, "While the work of the lettersmen is consistent throughout the season, fouracre is a newcomer every year, the outstanding star for the Blue and White."

Three Firsts

In the four meets, fouracre came through with three firsts and only a fifth on the last lap around the golf course in the Carnegie Tech meet. He followed him from within obtaining individual honors. Fouracre's best performance was in the Pitt meet where he finished the Schenley course in twenty seconds less than the record, formerly held by Coach Carnahan of the Pitt team. Highly second-place in the Thanksgiving meet, also broke the record by ten seconds.

With less than three weeks for the Blue and White harriers to travel to Syracuse on October eighteenth for the first meet of the season. Although fouracre took first place in this meet, the "orange hill-and-dales" race, alleged to be the toughest for the past two years and with the experience gained in a previous run, managed to come through with a victory.

Down Carnegie Tech

Pennsylvania Day witnessed a thrilling run between the Blue and White and Carnegie Tech but the latter were no match for their opponents and Coach Carnahan's men romped away with victory. Danely was first to break the tape in this meet, closely followed by Captain Decker of the Blue and White. Johnson, Charles and Stewart ran pretty well against Tech and were instrumental in their triumph.

Alfred College fell before Captain Decker and his mates on November fourth in the Long coming through with an easy win. Following this meet the team was about to abandon its misadventure had previously made into the intercollegiate ranks. However, Manager H. K. West, 25 opened negotiations with Pitt for a meet at Pittsburgh on Thanksgiving Day and that acceptance was received from the Smoky City authorities the day before the Panthers won the championship.

The meet with Pitt was the best of the season and it was only after a thrilling run that the Blue and White emerged victors in 27-30. The triumph over Pitt enabled Coach Carnahan to form a relative idea of how the Nittany

harriers would have fared in the intercollegiate had they been permitted to run. But one man, Captain Decker, will be lost to the team by graduation this year and prospects for another great team next season are exceptionally bright. Fouracre, Harlan, Charles Stewart, Johnson and Rice all of the 1921 organization will return again next season.

LAND GRANT COLLEGE ENROLLMENT COMPILED

Espenhilde's Data Shows Institutions Have One-third of All College Students

More than one-third of all the college students in the United States are enrolled in the land grant colleges and universities, according to figures compiled recently by Professor A. H. Espenhilde, former registrar of the College. There are fifty-two of these institutions, Penn State being the Pennsylvania unit in the chain formed by the passage of the Morrill act of Congress in 1862.

The total number of persons attending all of the colleges in the United States since the beginning of our colonial history about 300 years ago is \$25,475,000. This number fully one-fourth have been graduated from the land grant colleges during the past twenty-five years, according to Professor Espenhilde, who obtained his figures largely from data at educational agencies.

Latest enrollment figures show that there are about 1,000,000 men and women attending colleges and universities today. To show how the demand for college service has increased in recent years, Professor Espenhilde points out that this total is seventy per cent of the total number of persons graduated from American colleges since their founding. Of this total enrollment, the land grant colleges had two hundred and fourteen thousand students, or one-third of the total.



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

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
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
