COACH LEONARD DIRECTS FIRST STIFF WORK-OUTS

With the close of the first week of wrestling practice held under the guidance of Coach C. G. Leonard the Penn State grapplers have made but little headway toward the production of a winning team because of the shortage of promising material. In discussing the matter yesterday the Nittany member stated that he was greatly disappointed in the poor response made to the call for wrestling candidates.

Problems for a championship struggle this season received a severe blow when three of the most promising men on last year's freshman team failed to return this fall. These men were ranked in the 125, 135 and 155 pound weight classes, and their failure to reappear causes a pinch of material in these weight classes.

FRESHMEN TO AID IN CABIN PROJECT

First-year Men Will Clear Site for "Andy" Lytle Memorial in Shingletown Gap

With the object in view of clearing the site for the "Andy" Lytle large number of Nittany yearlings led by upperclassmen will leave the "Y" Hut tomorrow afternoon at one-thirty o'clock for Shingletown Gap where the work is located.

The clearing of the site and the building of the cabin is under the supervision of the Y M C A. The plot of ground consists of one acre and is located in a very picturesque spot to the south of Shingletown Gap. The work will be done in the afternoon and the cabin will be dedicated with a memorial to "Andy" Lytle. It will be located for the use of all responsible college organizations. North of the cabin site there is a low cut plot which has been donated to the College by Mr. Lytle to be used as a recreation park. The Y M C A has been selected to hold this plot in trust for the College and to see that it remains free from buildings.

In the Y M C A budget for the year there is an item of two hundred dollars for the building of the cabin. As this will not be enough to erect the structure student help is being solicited. R. D. Dunmore '27 is in charge of securing this help. Buck Taylor (Continued on third page)

DR. J. F. McCONNELL WILL ADDRESS CHAPEL

The Reverend J. F. McConnell, D. D., Bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church has been secured by College Chaplain Metzger to address both chapel services this Sunday.

Bishop McConnell, now residing in Pittsburgh has served as pastor of some of the largest Methodist congregations in New England and the eastern states and before his election to the bishopric in 1912 the Bishop was president of De Paux University holding this office from 1909 to 1912.

Dr. McConnell is the author of several well-known religious books among these being "Religious Conviction" published in 1910, "The Service of Faith" in 1912 and "Understanding the Scriptures" published in 1917. This author has consistently in demand is a college speaker and will be remembered as one of the most popular men who ever addressed Penn State chapel services.

DRIVE LAUNCHED FOR PENN'S CHARTER FUND

Campaign Among Nittany Students to Aid Purchase of Document Begins Today

Taking up its part of the State-wide campaign now in progress Penn State will begin a drive to aid in the purchase of William Penn's Charter of Liberties today and will close on Wednesday. The COLLEGIAN, edited by members of Student Council and the Blue Key society has completed practically all arrangements for the local campaign. Contributions will be solicited in the various classes next week and individual donations may be turned in at the COLLEGIAN Office. Subscriptions of any amount are welcomed, as is also the offer of the movement to have as wide a list of contributors as possible among the people of the State.

\$25,000 Needed The Charter is the original document given by William Penn to the citizens of the Commonwealth outlining and guaranteeing their liberties. More than two hundred years old, it is looked upon as one of Pennsylvania's most precious jewels and the purpose of the campaign is to raise a fund which will be used for securing a high quality reproduction of the original document. The amount collected so far is about seven thousand dollars.

Backed By Faculty Professor A. H. Bagnish has consented to take care of the financial details of the campaign. All donations will be turned over to him and forwarded to the PUBLIC LEDGER. No definite goal has been set at Penn State for the fund, although a generous response is expected from the student body.

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Ten Appear Before Tribunal As One Yearling Receives Maximum Penalty

An extremely "fresh-man" who spoke of his actions at his home and who was judged guilty of having broken every regulation except one, was punished accordingly. J. V. Pappert's card was read "ask me about my Summer home," and his locker will be stripped at the "Corner Barber Shop" in the near future.

J. De Long, who had forgotten to carry out all of his first Tribunal sentence, was requested to wear the regulation sixteen by twenty-four, with the inscription "I Need More Speed." Charged with not checking at the freshman grid games, and also with bringing his hands in his pockets, B. A. Brooks was adjudged guilty of the first offense. As a result he will wear the following placard for two weeks: "I Am Wild About Cheating."

Alleged to have been playing "hide and seek" on the green around, N. K. Hoffman, W. G. Stambaugh and J. K. Shueffer admitted their guilt, and for the next fortnight, each one will glance over his shoulders at a sign reading "I Was Caught On The Green."

Nine eating freshmen and one spoiled student appeared before the Student Tribunal at a meeting held last Wednesday evening in Room 215 Old Main. Six sentences were meted out by the court. Interpreting body and the yearlings were permitted to lay aside their drinks at the termination of the present semester. The first case to be called was that of J. H. Dreyer, a special student who had been accused of changing from a two-year course to the regulation college classification. A letter from the Dean of Men stating that Dreyer was a first-year student was entered as a special student so enough to convince the Tribunal that the accusation was untrue, and Dreyer was forthwith discharged. J. M. Russell '25 and J. L. Beson '25 will be released from the first-year men's privileges at the end of this semester, both men having gone through eleven weeks of customs at Pitt. R. L. Lagas, of the same class, was exempt from yearling regulations for the second semester having spent the month at West Point.
