

LION FORENSIC TEAM MAY MEET TEMPLE DEBATERS

Arrangements for Friday Contest at Harrisburg Are Not Fully Completed

Although no definite word has been heard from the Temple Union of Forensic Debaters in regard to the date scheduled for December 19th at Harrisburg, the members of the Penn State debating squad are working hard in preparation for this contest, and others in the near future. The annual triangular contest with Bucknell and Dickinson, which is one of the most important meets on the Nittany schedule is also not far off.

The proposition for both debates will be "Resolved That Congress should have the power, by a two-thirds vote to declare effective federal statutes promulgated by the United States Supreme Court." If the Temple University contest is held, the Penn State team will defend the affirmative and for the Bucknell-Dickinson meet the Nittany speakers will take the affirmative at home and the negative at Bucknell.

While little is known of the quality of the Temple University speakers, this is the first debate ever staged between the two colleges. Temple annually meets Penn, Columbia and other prominent forensic teams. The triangular contest with Bucknell and Dickinson, however, has been held every year since the growth of debating activities at Penn State. The result each year has been close with the honors for all the meets slightly favoring the Nittany debaters.

Fifteen men are at present reporting for practice, which is being held three times a week under the direction of Professor T. J. Gates. The Penn State team for the Temple University debate will be composed of J. J. Brennan '25, T. S. Anderson '25, and D. D. Henry '25. Although it is expected that some good material will be found in the sophomore extemporaneous speaking contest, more men are urged to come out for the team in order to make the present forensic season a success.

Chapter Decides to Give Monthly Program of Stinging Music as First Action

With the installation of Kappa Gamma Psi, national professional musical fraternity, another impetus has been given to the advancement of musical interest at Penn State. This new organization is the outgrowth of a group of musicians known as the "Harmonia Society," whose membership includes students interested in music as a life work. Immediately following the petition of the local Society, permission was granted by the fraternity to install the

Ephebe Chapter at Penn State. The most prominent of the certain chapters are located at Ann Arbor, Michigan, the Boston Conservatory of Music and the New England College of Music. In the past, the western chapters have done good work and many have become well-known.

Following the installation on Tuesday, December 13th, the newly-installed chapter discussed plans to increase the musical activities on the Nittany campus. It was decided to give a monthly program of stinging music as the first action in this respect. Further musical entertainment will be proposed at the next meeting of the fraternity. The members also are planning to increase the opportunities for Penn State students to hear classical music.

One of the national policies of the fraternity is to promote musical appreciation and efficiency in the execution of music. Annual plans to underwrite a series of exclusive preparation for National Music Week.

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
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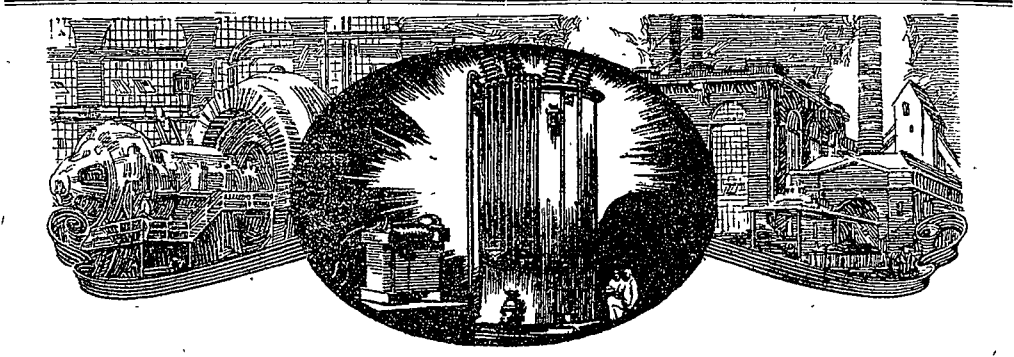
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
