PENN STATE GRANGE TO INSTALL NEW OFFICERS

Leader of State Association Will Speak to Local Group on Rural Activities

The Penn State Grange, an organization composed of over three hundred students interested in agriculture, will hold an open installation ceremony for the thirteen men recently elected as officers for the coming term at a meeting, seven o'clock tonight in Room 100 Horticulture Building.

P. H. Dewey, director of the Pennsylvania Grange, has been selected to speak on the work the grange is doing throughout the State, and both Messrs. Thomas and Dean Watts are expected to be present as well as other members of the faculty.

At present the State Grange is interested in the development of the rural power project as an aid to the farmers in Pennsylvania. It also has a committee meeting with the state legislature to get laws enacted of importance to rural people. At Penn State the main object is to enlist the members of the School of Agriculture in the local Grange so they will be ready for Grange work after graduation.

FACULTY COMMITTEE TO CONFER WITH PRESIDENT ON COLLEGE CUT SYSTEM

For the purpose of studying problems relating to class attendance, a committee consisting of seven members of the faculty has been appointed to cooperate with President John M. Thomas in organizing a uniform cut system in all the departments of the college.

A cut system is in operation in the School of Mines and Metallurgy which at times in the Agricultural School are reported to the Dean. The committee therefore feels that a uniform plan similar to those used in some of the other State colleges and universities is needed at Penn State.

The committee expects to meet in the near future and it is possible that a system will be decided upon and put into effect at the beginning of next semester.

Young and Stark are the main contenders. Mac' because of his experience gained in the dual meets and the intercollegiate last year, has a decided advantage over his fellow fifteen-pounder chief of whom are Gill and White.

A good number of 125-pound sluggers have been turning out for the daily workouts. Besides "Luddy" Washington last year's regular there are Rankin, A. Gans, Gockleis, Kennedy, Weaver, Thorsch, Dave Blank, McClelland, Williams and Lyle Washington is a little overweight at present but he will probably reach his natural weight in a long since practice bouts are now starting.

Went Works Hard

Captain Jack Went has been setting the pace for the thirty-five-pounders. In all of his training work he has been showing a hard plugging brand of work. However, he will probably reach his best team in actual fights. Along with him, there are six other feather pushers who have been working out since the first call was sounded. These men are Aps, Ben, Marhoffer, Jenkins, Mury and Agri.

The 145-pound division has a talented array of men. Captain of his freshman team in 1924 is one of the men of whom Coach Houck is counting upon this winter. Another Tom Zerbe is also expected to put up a strong fight for the post. The latter ringman was a vastly performer two years ago. In addition, there are Phillips, Carroll, Cohen, Fisher and Yoder, all of whom have shown to advantage thus far.

Heavier Fighters Scarce

There is a scarcity of material in the upper three weights. In the sixty-pound class, in addition to McPherson there are McDowell, Kell, Weiss and Bergman. The first three have been coming out regularly for practice. Kell and Weiss were both varsity boxers in the last two years. Weiss fought on the team two years ago, while Kell attempted at the same weight last year.

Besides Green, there are Halbert and Hastings in the seventy-five-pound ranks. Hastings because of the experience gained as captain of the freshman team of last year is expected to be a constant threat for the post. The 145-pound weight, this, too, is causing Coach Houck some worry.

In the heaviest the Nittany coach has Weisbro, Hitts and Gier. This position was vacated by Captain "Rags" Mather of last year's team, and it will be a problem to select his successor. Hitts a senior, has been trying for the team the past three years and has gained some valuable experience in this time. Weisbro is a sophomore and boxed on the freshman aggregation of last winter. Gier too has 27 men and this is his first attempt at the ring sport.

It is the desire of Coach Leonard to run in the additional meet on the 13th day of the month in order that the Blue and White grapplers may have the added training and experience for their clash here with Penn on February seventh. Under the direction of three paid coaches, headed by "Barney" Sevier, the Blue team are making extensive preparations for a full season and state that they will make it successful in the 1925 season which they recently lost.

Quicker Coach

In a recent sparring sketch it was stated that Sevier is not only a wrestler but a coach as well and that, in thinking there is no sport day yet here, he has held intercollegiate, regional and national titles at his weight which is under 120 pounds. He is now captain of the University of Pennsylvania's grappling squad and has had a successful season in his own right for the Red and Blue.

When the Quaker boys in Nittany Valley in January, they will bring one of the hardest combinations to be faced by the Blue and White this season but from past experience they will meet with stiff opposition. The attitude of the sport world has been good throughout the period of training, and the steady improvement is noticeable in both old and new men. Dunbar, Parthenore and Hitts seem to be swinging into their old-time form and among the new ones, Hitts, Green, the 115 pound class and Lutz in the 145 pound division have been doing good work.
