DEMANDS ON PENN STATE CONTINUE

Says "Prexy" in Making Annual Report

This Penn State "has reached the limit of growth possible without additions to its buildings and equipment." It is an outstanding point in the annual report continued in a booklet first published by the College and called "The State of the Pennsylvania State College to the Commonwealth."

The limit of growth is amplified in President Thomas' statement, for he says that the demand for vocational courses, which are specialties of the college, has by no means diminished.

"On the contrary," he says, "there is evidence both in pressure for admission and the requirements of the industries for technical graduates, that there is need in Pennsylvania for the further development of this college."

As outlined by Pennsylvania laws regarding the Morrill land grant college act of Congress, the report is addressed officially to members of the State Senate and House of Representatives, by the president of the board of trustees, Judge H. Walton Mitchell, of Pittsburgh. The first copies of the booklet have already been sent to members of the state legislature. Others will be distributed among the alumni and friends of the College.
