PENN STATE INSTRUCTOR CONDUCTS RESEARCH ON KENTUCKY BLUE GRASS

Recent research in Kentucky blue grass is being conducted by J. W. White, Professor of soil, the horticulture at Penn State. In his study of the blue grass, which is one of the most important crops of the Commonwealth, White has discovered that the plant is not as hardy as it is generally supposed to be. He has found that the grass is very susceptible to frost damage and that it is necessary to take special precautions to protect it during the winter months. White's research is being conducted in the laboratory of the Department of Horticulture, and the results of his study will be published in a paper in the next issue of the Journal of the American Society of Horticultural Science.

 Four rounds of shadow boxing with the actual and the shadow boxing sessions are set down for four rounds of three minutes each.
 Four stanzas of sand bag work then occupy the attention of Captain West and his men. This is followed by the same amount of pushing exercises. In all cases the rounds are three minutes long, with a rest of half a minute between each one. Twelve minutes of handling the medicine ball are required after the boxers have completed their pushing exercises. The last bit of inside work on the end consists of stomach exercises. The final workout is a 10-minute climbing of the board track.
 No call has yet been issued for evening practice but Coach Houtz plans to start work soon. One meet has already been called that being the one at Lewistown with the representative of the Y. M. C. A. in that city. The freshman-sophomore set up will be held the following week-end. At present the only work being done with the 1925 freshmen is accomplished in the Physical Education classes directed under the supervision of Coach Houtz.

SHORT POULTRY COURSE OFFERED FOR FEBRUARY

Will Be Given in First Week of Next Month—Teaching Staff in Charge of Work
 A Short Poultry Course will be given next month in place of the fourth annual Poultry Week which has been held at Penn State in previous years. The first week of elementary work will first from February second to the seventh while the second will be more advanced and will contain more practical work.
 This is the result of a request from a number of correspondence students enrolled in the poultry course for something more advanced than the usual routine of the poultry week.
 During the first week there will be provided a lecture and a discussion period followed by laboratory practice in some particular branch of poultry keeping. Practically all the time of the second week will be given over to problems and discussion of specific problems which the commercial men are facing.
 The entire teaching and research staff of the department together with several extension specialists in poultry husbandry will devote their time to instructing the students in the short course. All equipment will be available for this week. A mammoth chicken thousand incubator has recently been installed and will be in operation for demonstrations.
 In the College poultry buildings sixteen hundred fowls are housed, which represent some of the finest stock in the state from the standpoint of production and standard requirements. Most of the birds have been transported so that an interesting study may be made of their records. A special incubator has been provided for the candling and grading of eggs so that everyone may have an opportunity to study the requirements of the United States egg grading laws.

INTERCLASS WRESTLING MATCH IS SCHEDULED

Regulation Intercollegiate Rules To Govern Bout—Date Is January Thirty-first

Announcement was made this week by wrestling coach R. G. Leonard that the annual interclass wrestling meet at Penn State will be staged on Saturday, January thirty-first. With interest in interclass wrestling aroused this year it is expected that a large number of men will turn out in competition for the class. This makes the 1925 interclass meet one of the most successful ever held.
 In this year's meet contestants will be required to come down to the weight at which they are entered. For this reason all men who plan to try for class teams are urged to come out now and to begin training for weight and condition. Weights ropes track and mats are available at the Amory and it is the hope of those in charge of wrestling that a large number of men will try themselves of the opportunity to train for a short time previous to the meet.
 Regulation intercollegiate rules will apply to the bouts and for this reason fairly good condition will be necessary on the part of participants. The length of intercollegiate bouts is nine minutes with two extra three minute periods to choose the winner. If necessary a deciding man on top who shall be chosen by lot.
 The bouts will be decided upon aggressiveness and wrestling ability and a decision will not be given with a time advantage of less than one minute. This time advantage does not compel the referee to award a decision however, and all time advantage gained in nine minutes will be disregarded in the three extra minutes if the additional period be required.

NEW FURNACE IS SECURED BY LOCAL CERAMIC DEPARTMENT

The Ceramic department of the School of Mines has recently completed the installation of a new high temperature furnace in the laboratory in Old Mining building. This furnace is of a special type known as the "hot box" and will be used in high temperature work only. The piece completes the equipment in the new laboratory for the teaching of Ceramics.
