Professor Dye Elected President of Faculty Organization at Annual Meeting

ENLARGEMENT OF CLUB HOUSE IS CONSIDERED

W. S. Dye, h. professor of English was elected president of the University Club and D. F. McFarland, vice-president, at the annual meeting held at the club house Monday night January nineteenth.

A spirit of accord and progress was manifested in the report of the various committees which showed that the club is on a solid financial footing, and will have excellent all-industry except first mortgage bonds by 1927.

The need of expansion was emphasized to provide additional dormitory space, to facilitate the handling of the social activities of the club and to provide more pleasant recreation quarters in the basement. Plans are under consideration for financing and carrying out a program of enlargement.

Nothing more was taken of the loss by death during the past year of two of the club's most distinguished members, Dr. Edwin Dale Sparks and Judge Henry C. Quiley. Dr. Sparks was one of the charter members, and an active participant in the meetings of the board of directors during the entire fifteen years of the club's history.

The board of directors recommended and the membership heartily concurred in the election of Professor F. L. Foster and Professor D. D. Walker to honor their life memberships as a special mark of distinction for noteworthy service to the club.

Colonel McLaughlin To Give Out Information Concerning Summer Camps

Applications for admission to the summer Camps Military Training Camps which are being conducted throughout the country by the government for men between the ages of sixteen and twenty-three years will be received from residents of this immediate district by Col. Leonard McLaughlin at the Amos, Pa. office.

The district includes Clinton Center, Union and Mifflin counties. J. D. Payne of Bellefonte has been named county procurement officer for Centre county. The allotment of soldiers from these counties have been set as follows: Clinton twelve, Centre twenty-five, Union five, Mifflin twelve.

Attendance at the C. M. T. Camps established throughout the country is for a period of one month generally from about July first to August first. Four courses are offered: the first, red, white and blue. First year men are given the basic course. For those who have attended these camps one, two or three years previously, the red, white or blue course respectively, is given. Those who finish the four summer courses are eligible to take examinations for army commissions.

Detailed information and applications may be had from Col. Payne at the Amos office or from Mr. Payne in Bellefonte. Men from the Third Army Corps area in which Pennsylvania is included will attend Camp Meigs, Md.
