

### GREEK WINTER SPORTS GET UNDER WAY SOON

#### Fraternity Wrestling and Boxing Bouts Governed by Rules of Intercollegiate

Seventeen wrestling and eleven boxing teams are now entered in these two new branches of intercollegiate sports. The respective managers hope to have at least twenty-five contestants and will not begin the meets before the middle of this month.

With a view to making it possible for every house to have an entrant in each class it was decided that there should be five weights which are 120, 112, 116, 128, and 175 pounds with a three pound overweight allowance for the grapplers. All intercollegiate rulings will apply except that the bouts will last only six minutes instead of nine. C. C. Gingsel '26, who has charge of the organization of the mat squads, is planning to have, by the use of double mats, four encounters on each Tuesday and Thursday evenings.

In the little skirmishes the weights will be the same except for the fourth belt which is 140 pounds, overweight allowance being four pounds. These two-minute rounds have been substituted for the regular combat periods. Since there will probably be fewer entrants in this department, Manager A. L. Jenkins '27 wishes to hold the fights on Saturday afternoons when there will be no other events.

Cups Purchased  
Loving cups have been ordered for the winning team in boxing and the topmost contestant on the mat. Neither one is quite as large as the one given to the champion Greek letter basketball five. When they arrive they will be put on exhibition in Co-op window.

An admission fee of one dollar per entry is charged to defray the general expenses. Information concerning gloves will be given out later.

Because of the lack of funds, progress has been delayed to some extent. However, several units have already been composed and are training for the coming engagements. Any house team or individuals in it can receive special instruction under coaches Houck and Leonard by joining with the varsity squad for practice between five and seven o'clock in the evening. These two mentors have generously offered their services and will probably act as referees for the bouts.

### MOVING PICTURE SERIES WILL REPLACE MONDAY MILITARY LECTURE HOUR

An innovation in military instruction at Penn State is set to take effect Monday when motion pictures took the place of the regular afternoon assembly this week. According to Lieut. Col. Leonard McLaughlin, head of the Military Department, this method of instruction will be followed in Monday classes until early spring.

A progressive course is being given on the screen during the cold weather. Scenes showing equipment, maneuvers, formations and military operations will be shown with explanatory subtitles. Motion pictures in military instruction are not altogether new, according to Col. McLaughlin. This method of education has been applied successfully in training schools and camps and at other colleges where ROTC units are established. Penn State, in securing the progressive movies series, has secured a place in the film circuit which includes Pittsburgh and West Virginia universities and Carnegie Institute of Technology.

### CIVIL ENGINEERS WILL BE SHOWN WAR BRIDGE FILM

The student chapter of the American Society of Civil Engineers will present in Old Chapel a film and slides illustrating methods of bridge construction during the World War. On February 10th Captain Cunningham will conduct the presentation, and will explain each slide with a short talk. The subject will be an extremely interesting one in that it will bring out the methods of the American Expeditionary Forces used in constructing bridges rapidly for troop movements in territory under fire.

For the March meeting of the A. S. C. E., arrangements are being made to secure a film showing the processes of building highway machines, and a speaker probably will be sent by the company sending the film. Short talks will be given by the civil engineering students at both these meetings. Prizes are to be offered to the students making the best talks.

The second issue of "The Civil Engineer," the official publication of the student chapter of the A. S. C. E., will come out the second week of this month. It will contain a condensed report of the previous meetings of the school year and plans for the future meetings.

Eleven Ceramic students at a meeting last Friday night drew up a petition to the American Ceramic Society to establish a student branch at Penn State.

Professor Shaw headed the movement and gave a short talk. He, with M. L. Wexler '27, E. L. Brown '27, W. H. Holl '27 has been designated to prepare a constitution for the organization. G. W. Hemmerly '27 was elected president and H. R. Gingsel '26 was chosen secretary-treasurer. The charter members are G. J. Bah '27, L. L. Brown '27, H. R. Gingsel '26, G. W. Hemmerly '27, W. H. Holl '27, E. J. Murray '28, A. R. Myer '28, E. W. Lough '28, J. H. Shultz '28, M. L. Wexler '27 and W. S. Williams '27.

The object of the society is to promote fellowship and disseminate information on the subject of ceramics. In keeping with this policy there will be three addresses given at each meeting, which is to be held on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month in room 119 Old Mining building at seven o'clock. #### State Appropriations to College Must Be Increased To Hold Worthy Staff Men

Much of the increased appropriation asked of the legislature for the Pennsylvania State College is needed to hold "key men" on the faculty and to give more adequate compensation to deserving staff members, according to President John M. Thomas.

In the legislative budget in the recently published reports of college officers, "The Service of the Pennsylvania State College to the Commonwealth," Doctor Thomas says:

"Salaries at Penn State have been below a proper standard for years, and notwithstanding some recent increases they are still inadequate. Particularly in this time of the salaries of 'key men' the department heads and full professors who determine the worth and strength of an institution.

Such men should not be asked to serve and cannot long be retained if the compensation they are now receiving at this institution.

Professor Miller, head of the department, is now touring the State supervising the work being done over the educational problems with the men and consulting and advising them in every way possible to improve the department.
