Training Work

Some results of the strenuous training work ordered by the Lion mentor at the beginning of the year are now being observed. This has been particularly true in the matter of developing endurance and wind. With the aid of track work the wind of most of the men has been bettered to a marked degree. Better endurance has also resulted from this running and from the various gymnasium exercises such as jumping the rope, shadow boxing and weight pulling.

Soon after the opening of the second semester the first athletic call will be given for freshman field candidates. Three or four scullings have been working out regularly along with the varsity performers, but most of the instruction has been given through the medium of classwork. This work has been under the direct supervision of Coach Houck aided by a few veterans of last year's team.

freshman, in the time of 5 minutes 3 seconds. Prevost, senior heavyweight, threw Schminky, sophomore, in 5 minutes 47 seconds, while "Pop" Garrison, freshman heavy, threw "Bill" House, junior representative in the abbreviated interval of 2 minutes 47 seconds.

At the end of the preliminaries during which fourteen bouts were run off, the score stood seniors 12 Juniors 8, sophomores 0 freshmen 7. The method of scoring used awarded 2 points for a fall and 1 point for a decision in the preliminary bouts and gave 5 points for a fall and 3 points for a decision in the finals. The latter method is that used in regular interclass matches.

Final Bouts

In the final clashes, Cary, 115 pound senior, threw Martin, freshman, in 1 minute 21 seconds. Lehman, senior, threw Elsenbuth, 125 pound junior representative, in 1 minute 36 seconds. Oeter wrestling 135 for the seniors, lost to Lizzert, 135 pound junior, by a decision showing a time advantage of 4 minutes 24 seconds.

In the 145 pound class, Black, senior, threw Giff, junior, in 1 minute 48 seconds. At the 155 pound weight Manning, senior, threw Dowd, junior, in 2 minutes 55 seconds. In the 175 pound division, "Sam" Rumbough, junior captain, threw Took, senior, in the shortest bout of the meet, requiring only 1 minute 11 seconds to down his man.

The most interesting bout of the match was staged in the unlimited division final when Prevost, senior, met "Pop" Garrison, freshman representative. Taking the initiative from the first Prevost maintained the upper hand for several minutes but then, amid deafening cheers from the yelling section, the 1925 favorite overcame his husky opponent and took the offensive position. With but two minutes to go the big football man again gained the advantage and held it by a narrow margin until time was called. The decision declared Prevost winner, with a time advantage of 2 minutes 42 seconds.

appropriations to other institutions of higher learning be discontinued. It made no concrete recommendation of which college should be chosen for the university.

"Two years ago the State Council of Education was asked to study the same question when appropriations for education were before the Legislature, involving large increases in the total for education. The council at that time recommended that as State College, and the universities of Pennsylvania and Pittsburgh had all been chartered as State institutions of higher learning, that State appropriations to them be continued, and that as Temple University reported that State assistance would probably be needed only until 1927 or 1928 that financial aid be extended to Temple also until that time.

Bills For Penn State

State College, in appropriation bills already introduced, asks \$1,224,220 for maintenance and extension work, and \$2,000,000 for buildings, a total of \$3,224,220 from State funds. The Governor's budget carries \$2,208,000 appropriation from the general fund for the institution. This is an increase of \$100,000 over two years ago. There is also an amendment to the Constitution passed in 1921 and presented again this week for second approval before being submitted to the voters for ratification for a bond issue of \$8,000,000 for buildings and equipment at State College, but this would not be taken from current revenue.

"The University of Pennsylvania has presented bills for \$2,250,000 for the next two years, and another asking for \$2,250,000 as a deficiency appropriation for the present two years owing to an error which the Governor admits in making the appropriations two years ago. For the next two years, the Governor's budget carries \$1,230,000 for the

University of Pennsylvania, a reduction of \$1,020,000 from the requests of the board of trustees.

"No appropriation bills have been introduced as yet for the University of Pittsburgh and for Temple University. The budget carries the same amounts for these two institutions as two years ago, \$900,000 for Pittsburgh, and \$270,000 for Temple. For the Woman's Medical College, the budget asks \$100,000, an increase of \$80,000 over two years ago.

"The budget carries a total of \$5,634,611 for institutions of higher education from the general and other funds, an increase of \$180,000 over the budget of 1924. Under the recommendation of the Commission on Constitutional Revision in 1920, this entire amount would be available for a single institution, developed into a State university."
